Executive Summary

Cooperative Institutional Research Program (CIRP) 2006 Freshman Survey Results for Lincoln University

The Cooperative Institutional Research Program (CIRP) is a national longitudinal study of the American higher education system. Originally established by the American Council on Education, the program is now administered by UCLA's Higher Education Research Institute (HERI).

Annually, the CIRP oversees the development and implementation of the Freshman Survey, a questionnaire designed to provide institutions with a method of collecting data on their entering freshman class, as well as national normative data for students in similar types of institutions, for use in institutional decision-making, research, and assessment activities. During the Fall 2006 semester, Lincoln University freshman students enrolled in GE 101 (University Seminar) participated in the 2006 CIRP Freshman Survey. 261 First-Time, Full-Time freshman students (47%) responded to the survey. Of those 261 students, 118 (45%) were male and 143 (55%) were female.

This report provides a summary of selected responses from the 261 First-Time, Full-Time Freshman students that responded to the survey. National normative data, as selected by the CIRP, includes all public, 4-year institutions with low selectivity admission criteria. The complete report is available for review in the Center for Assessment, Institutional Research and Planning (B12 Young Hall).

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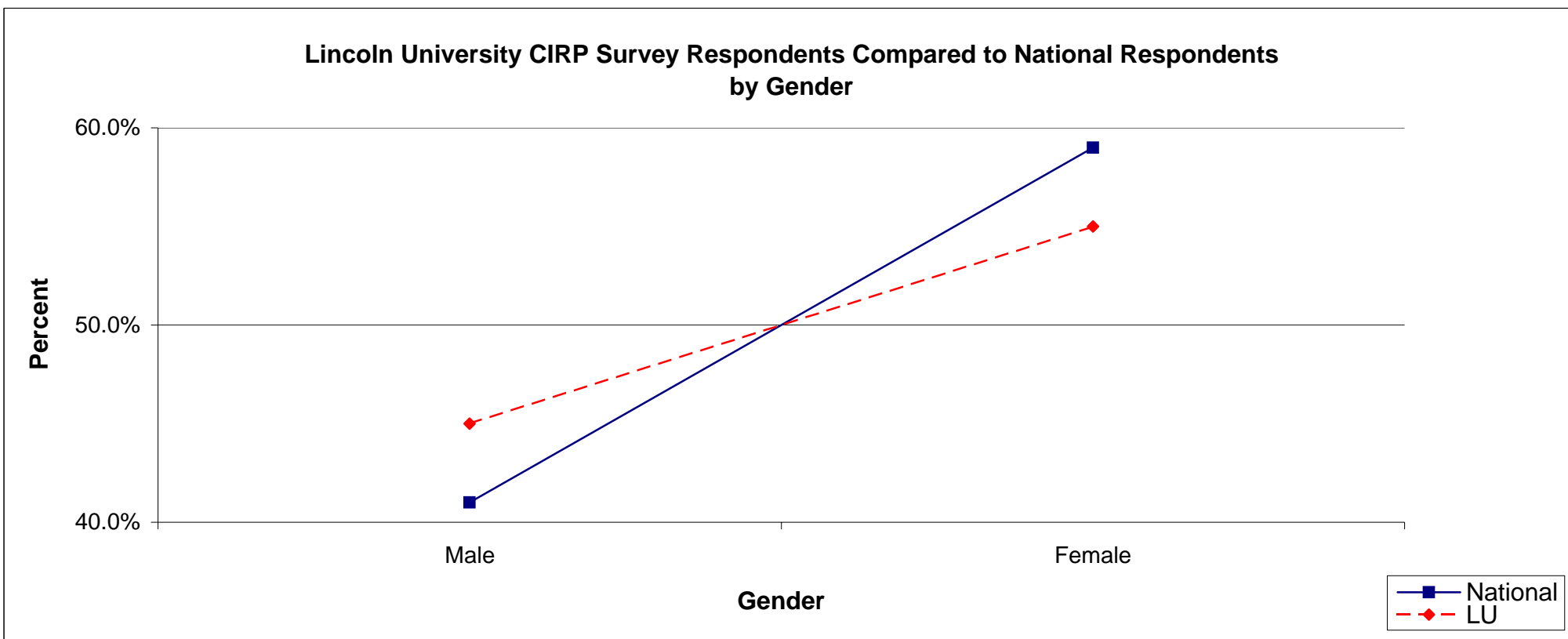

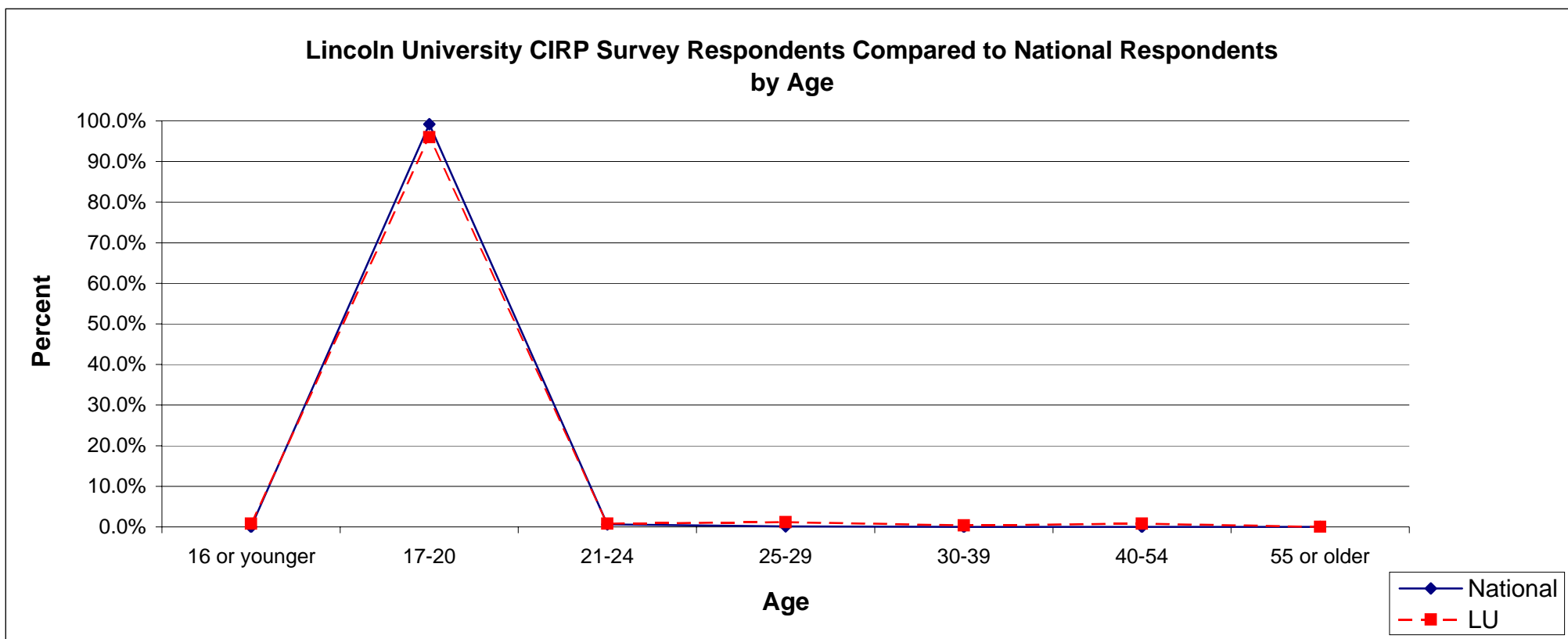

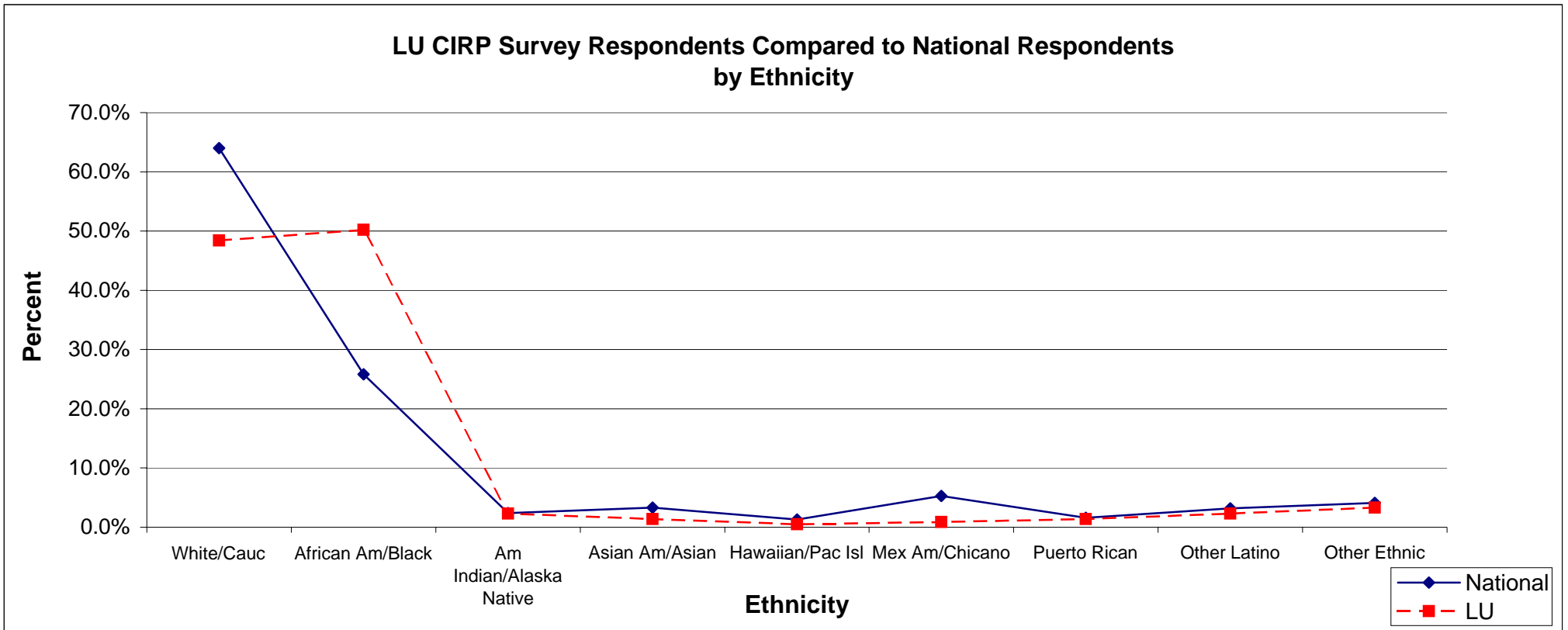

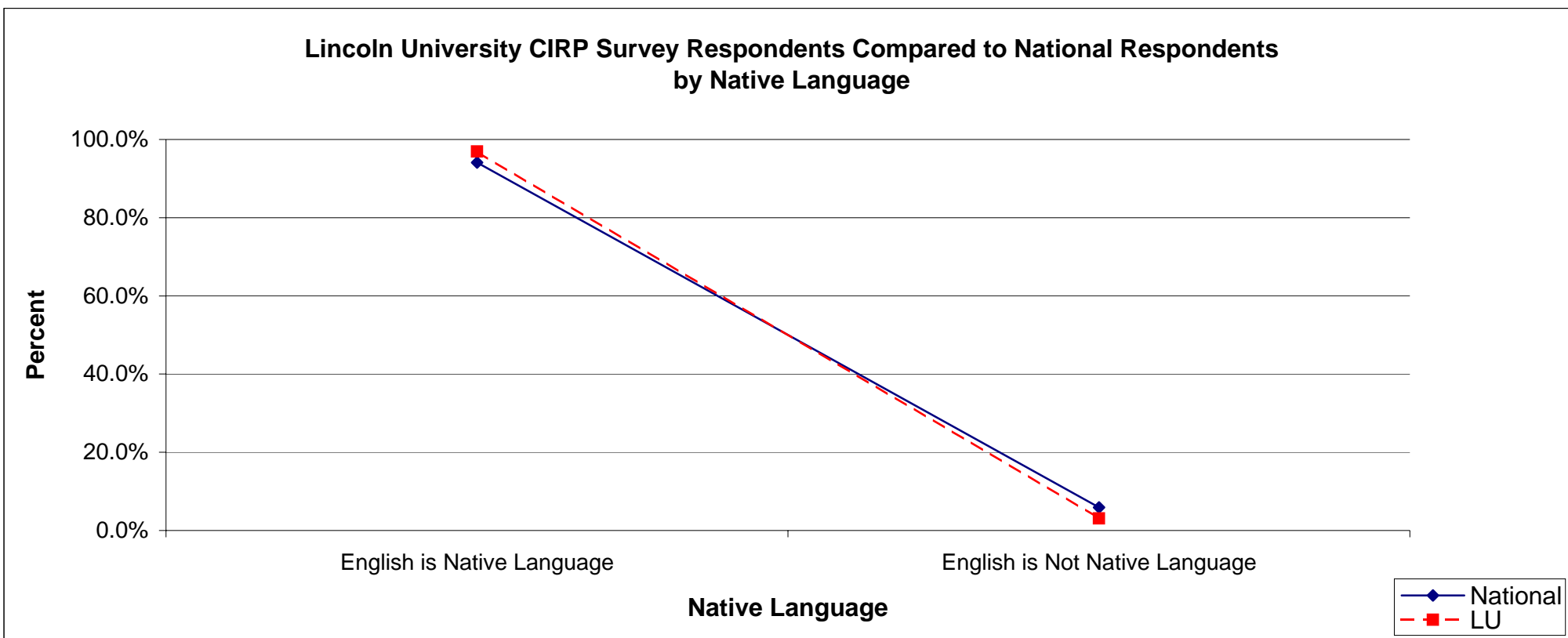

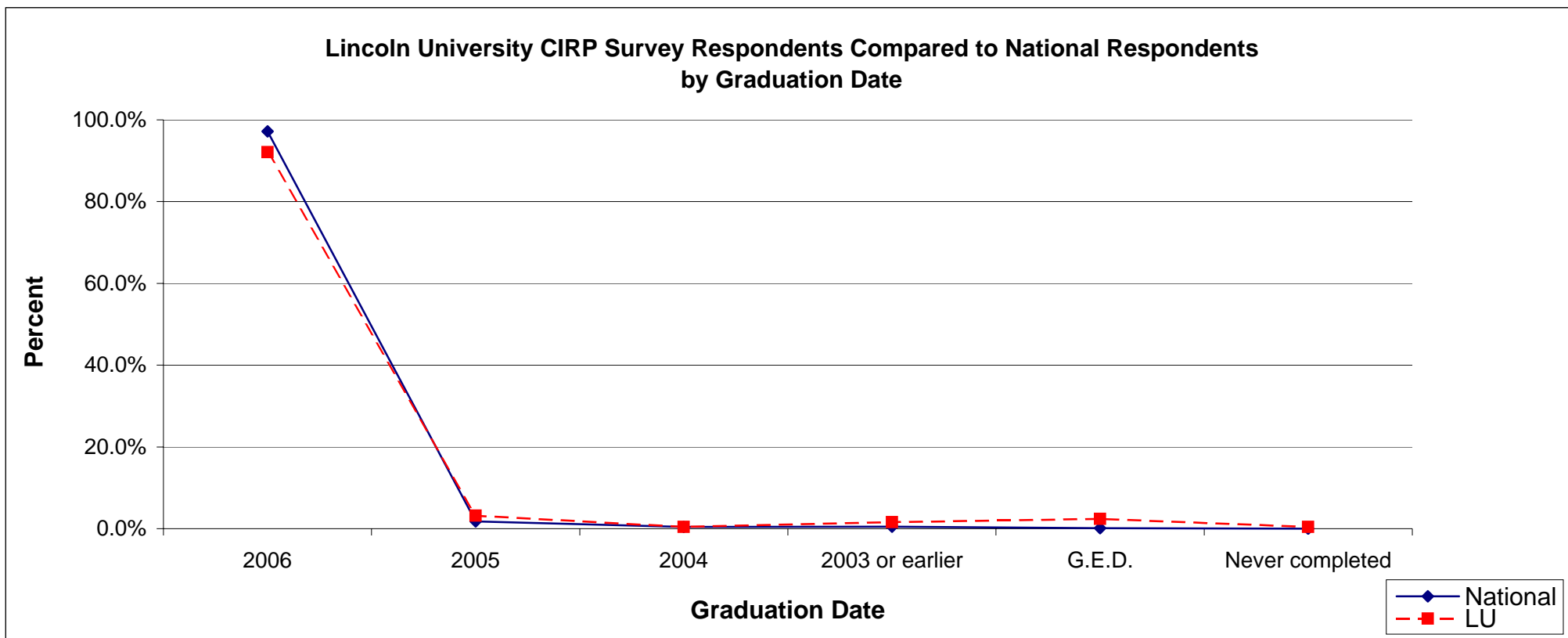

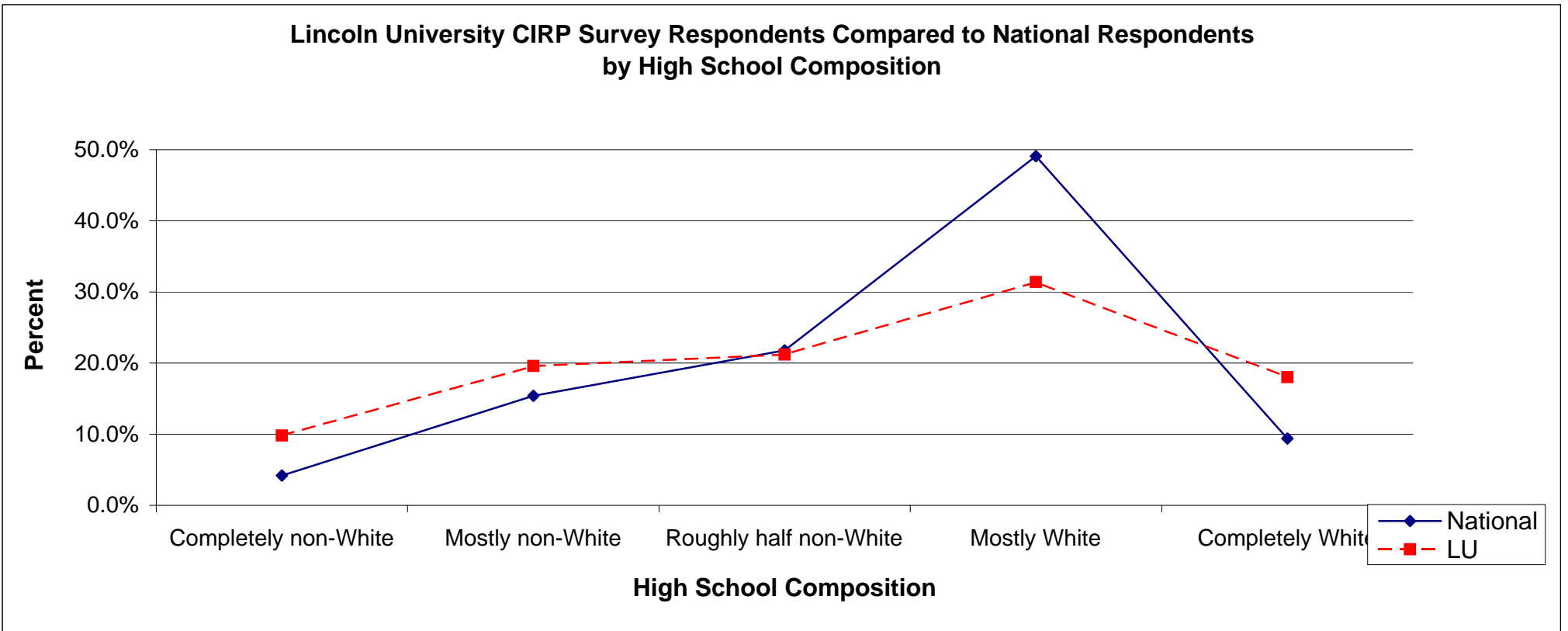

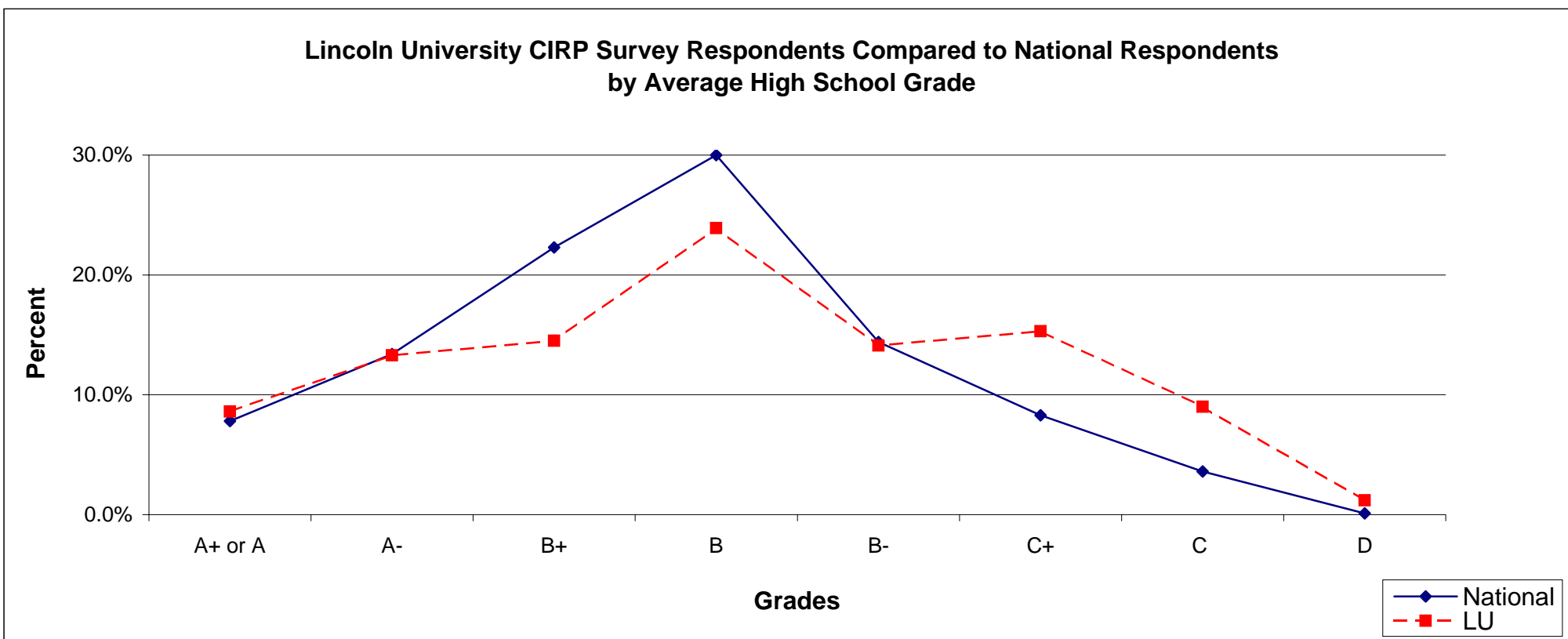

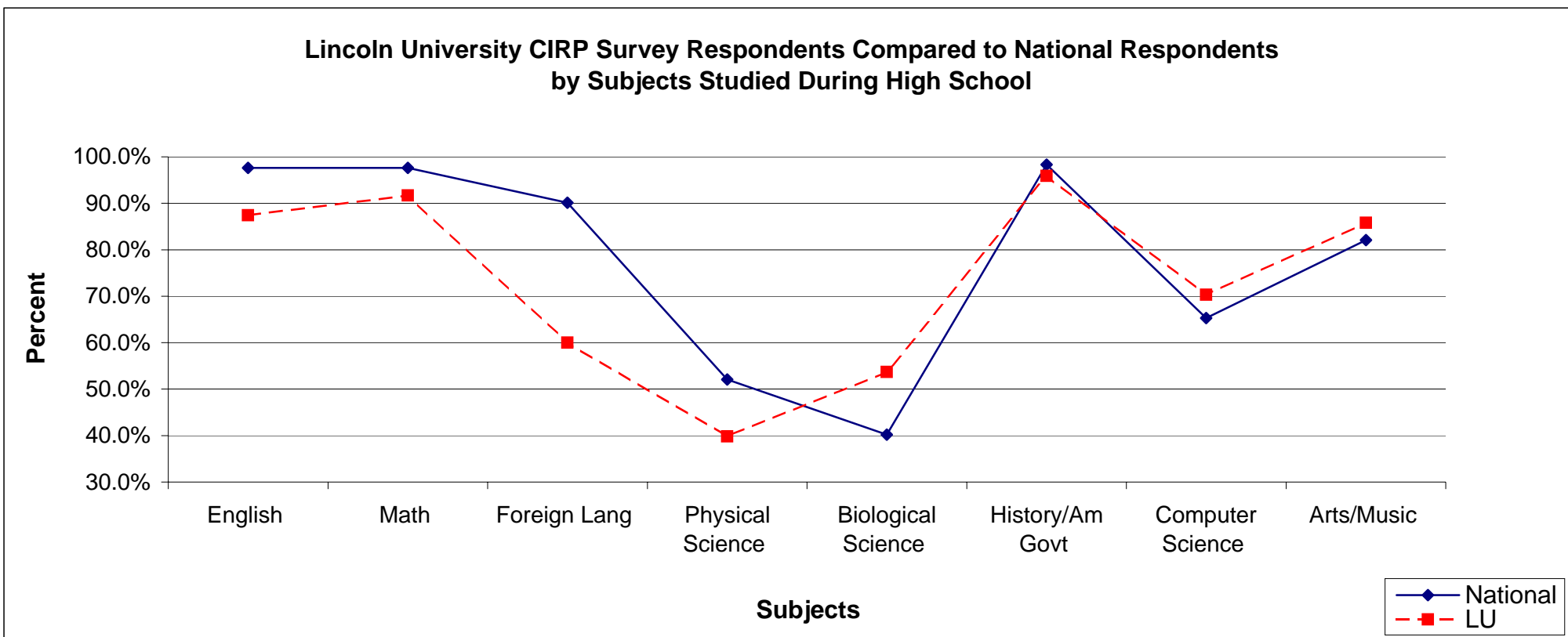

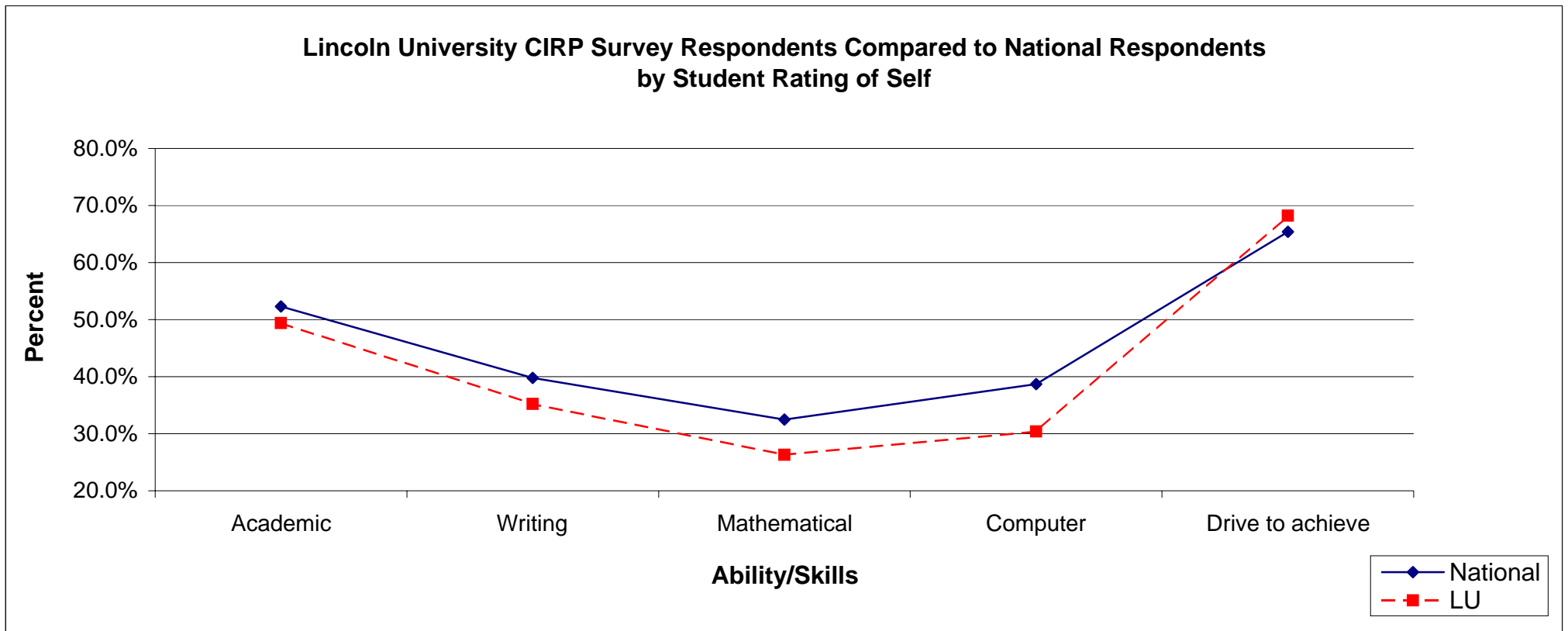

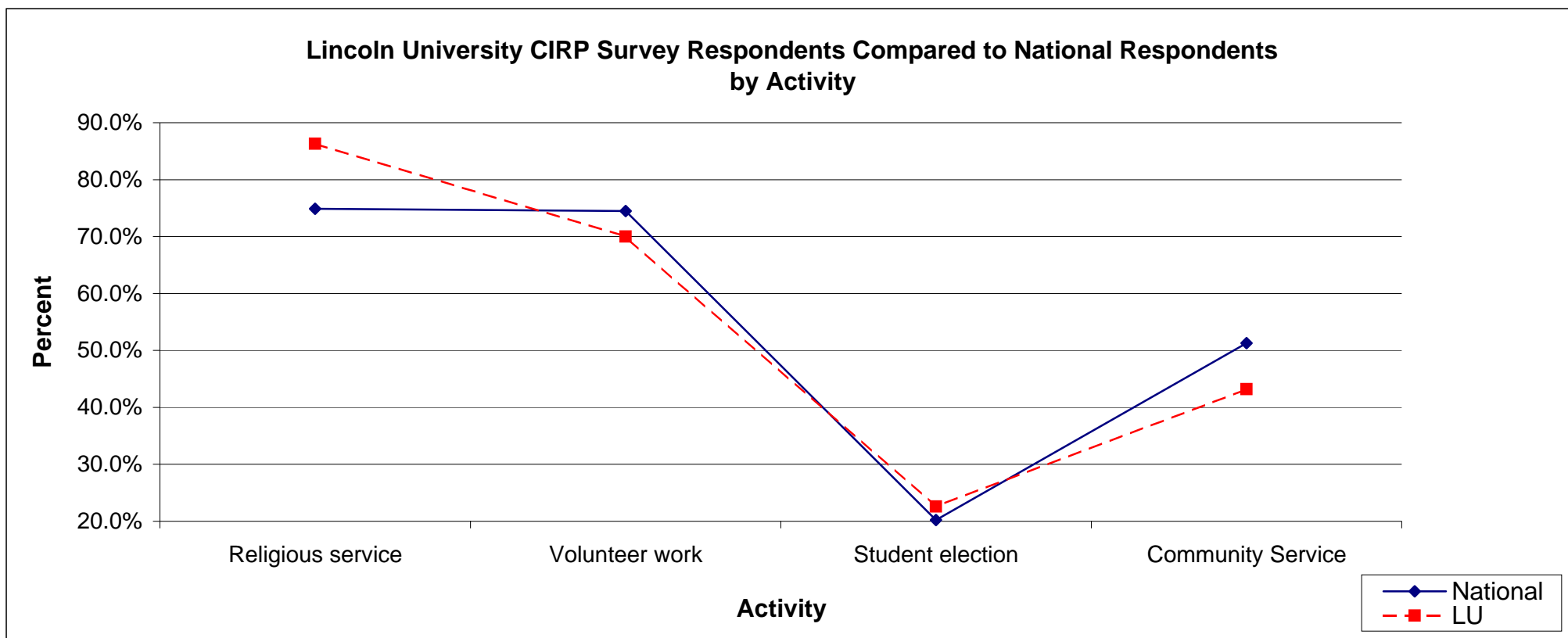

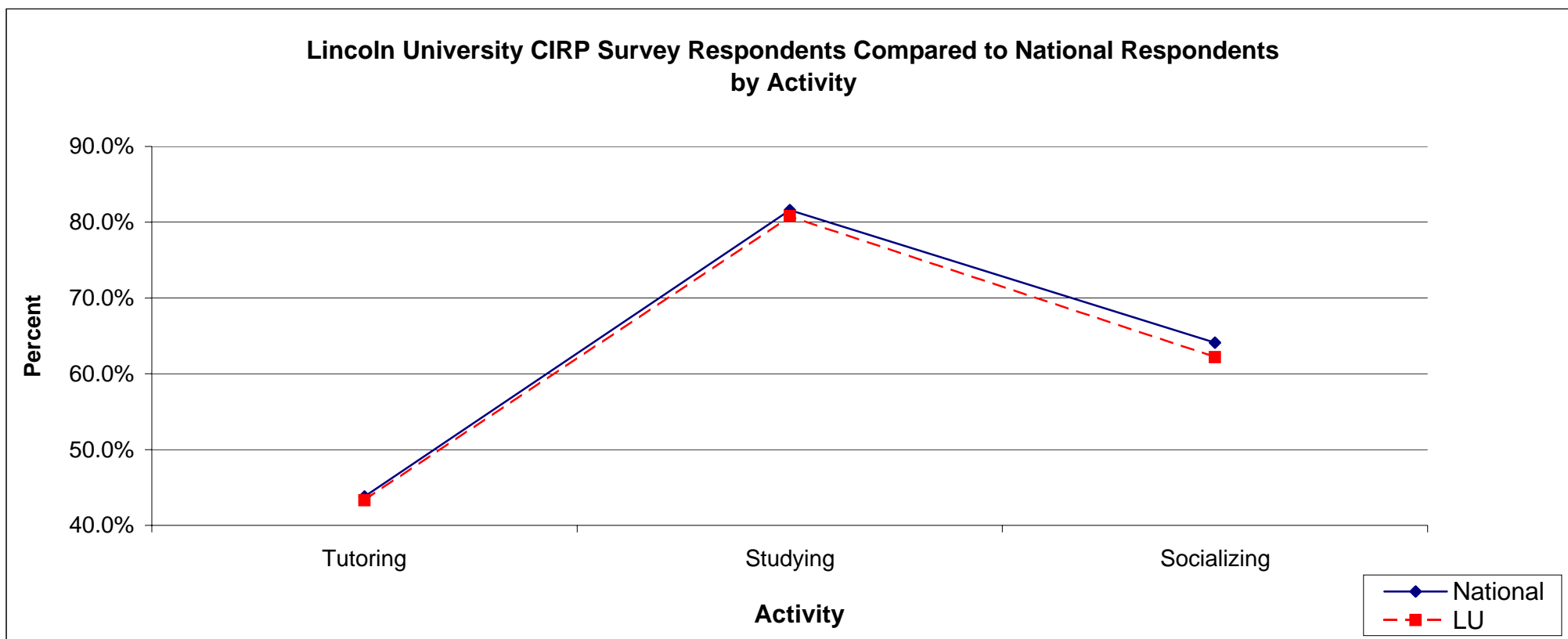

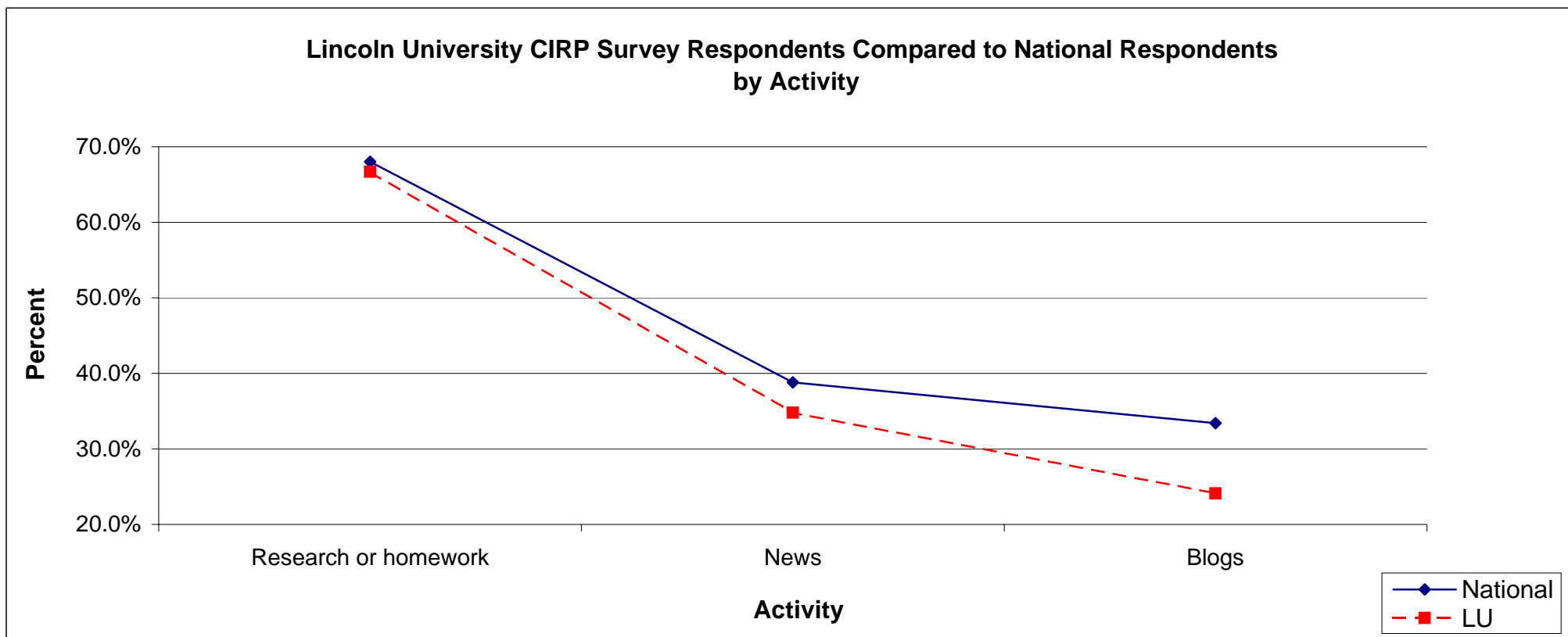

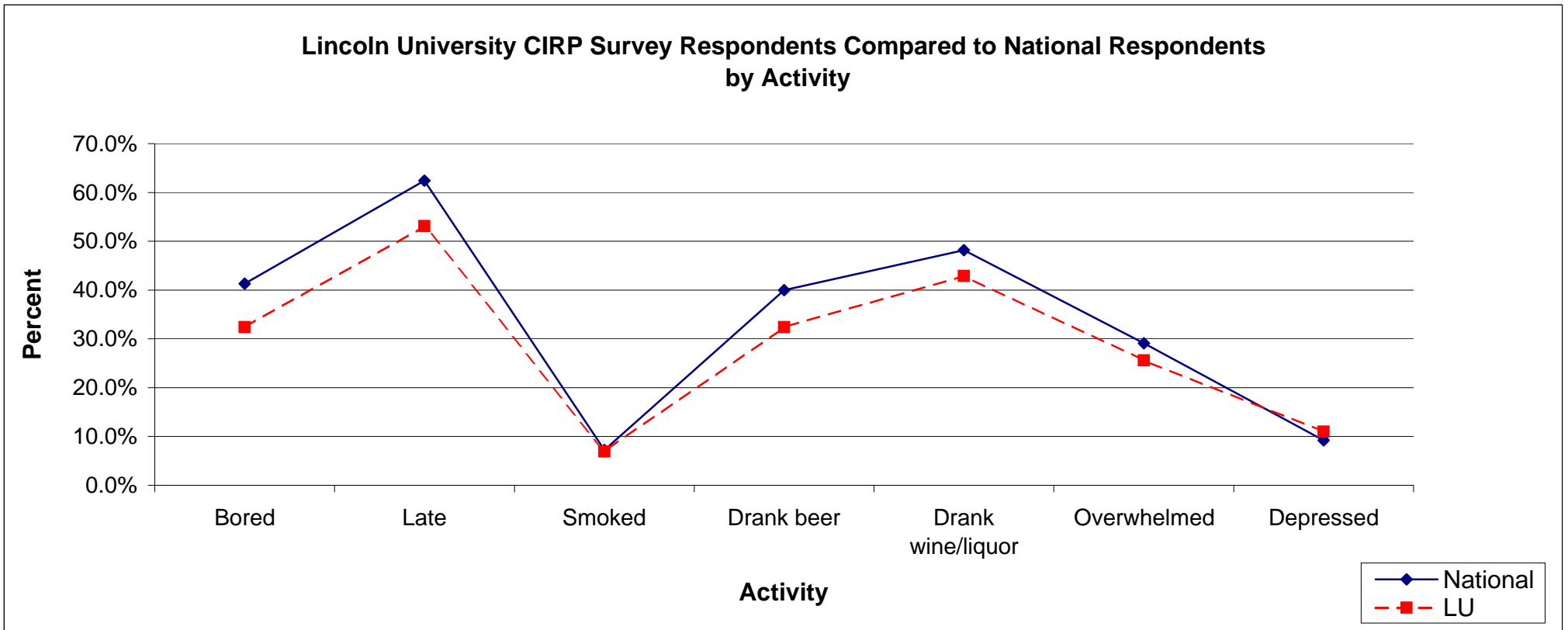

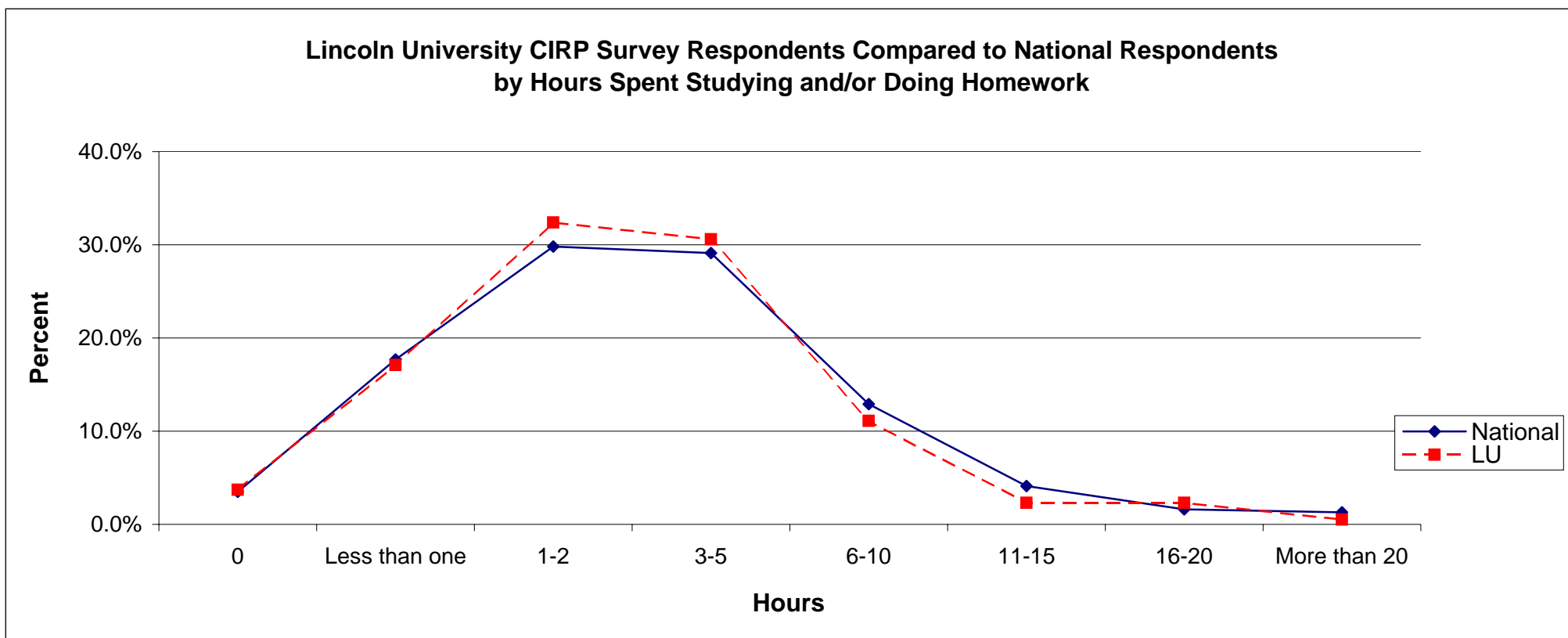

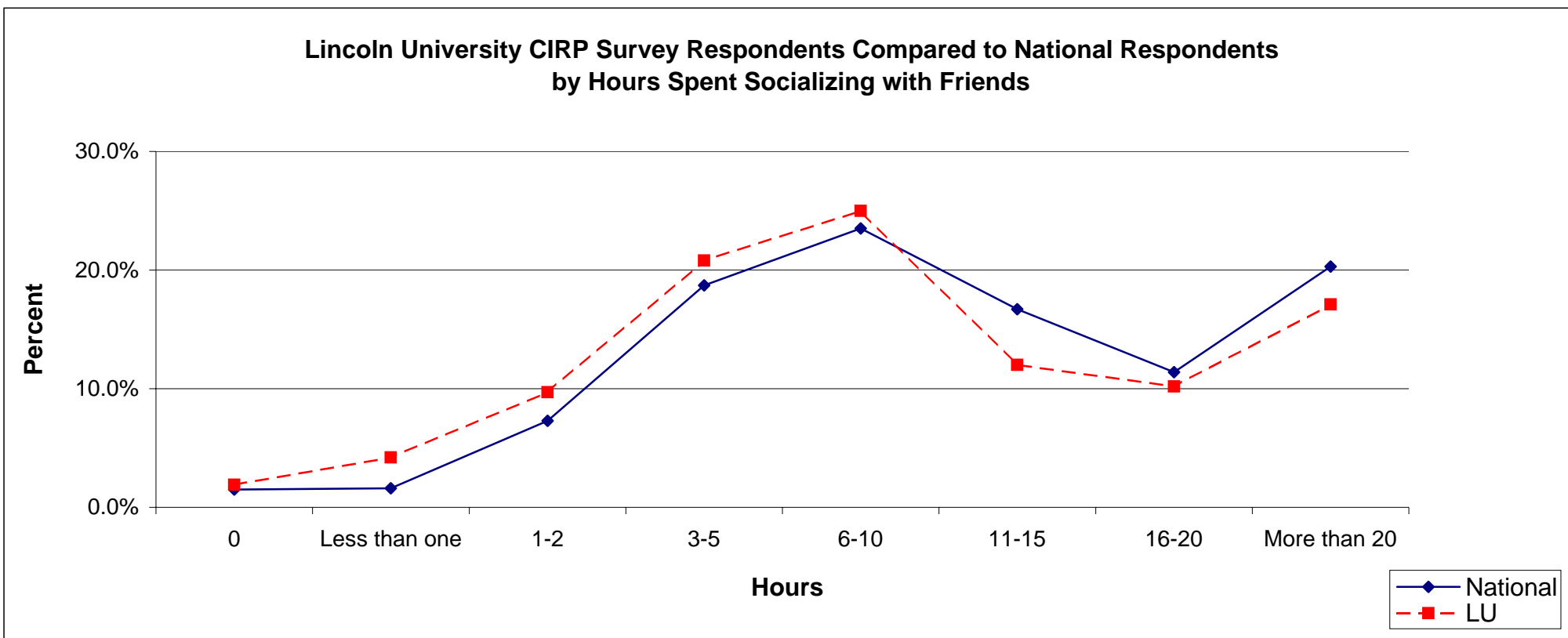

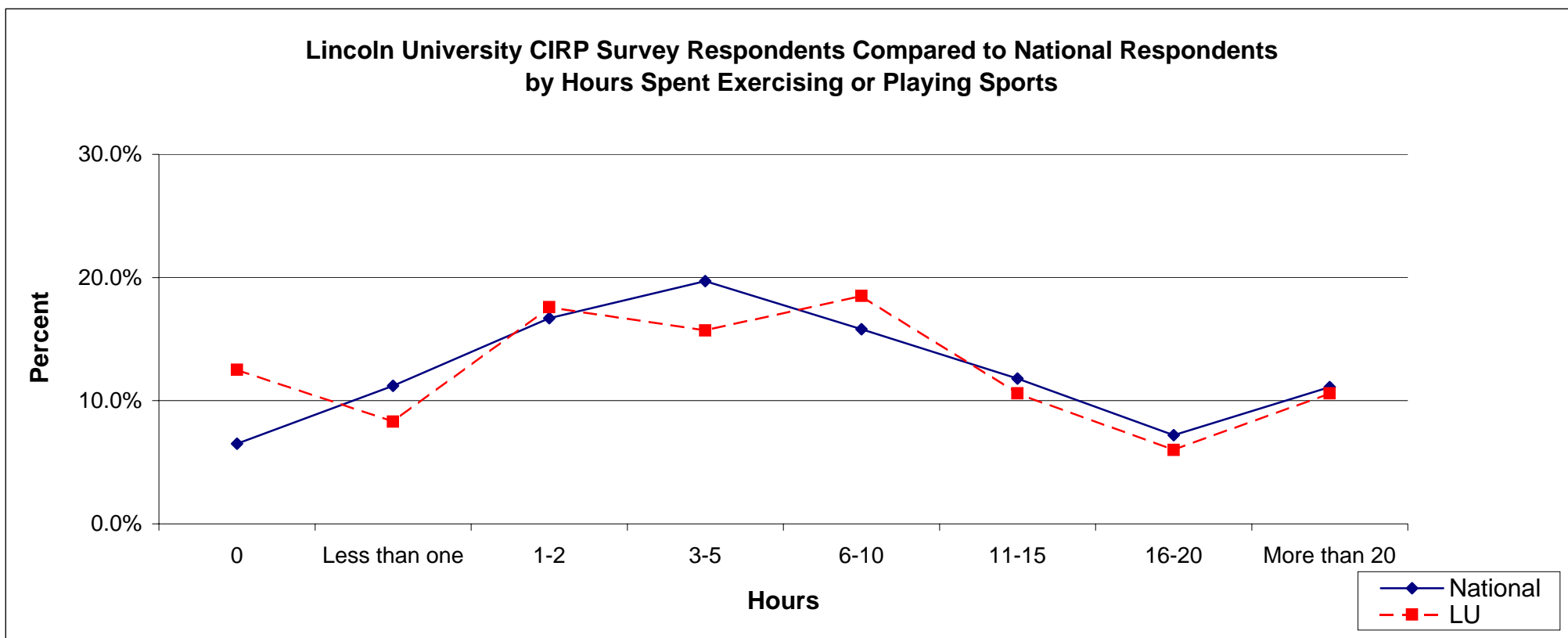

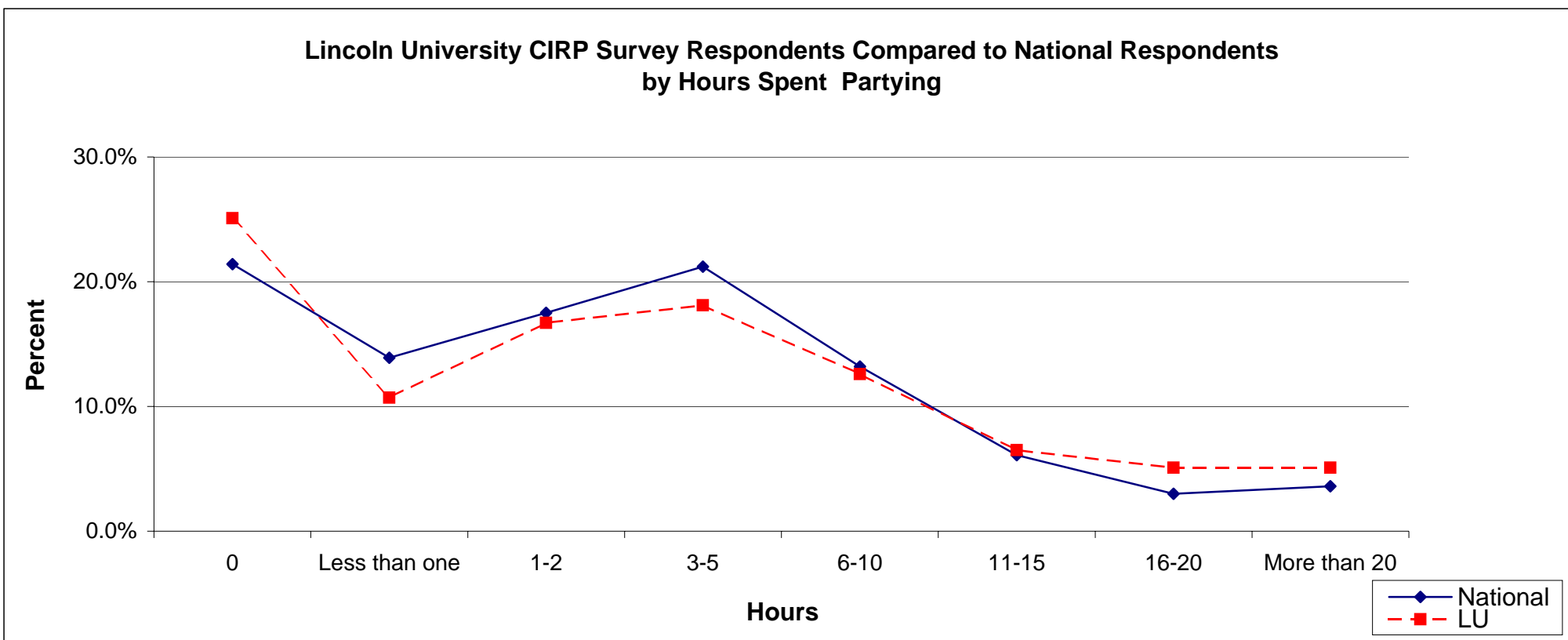

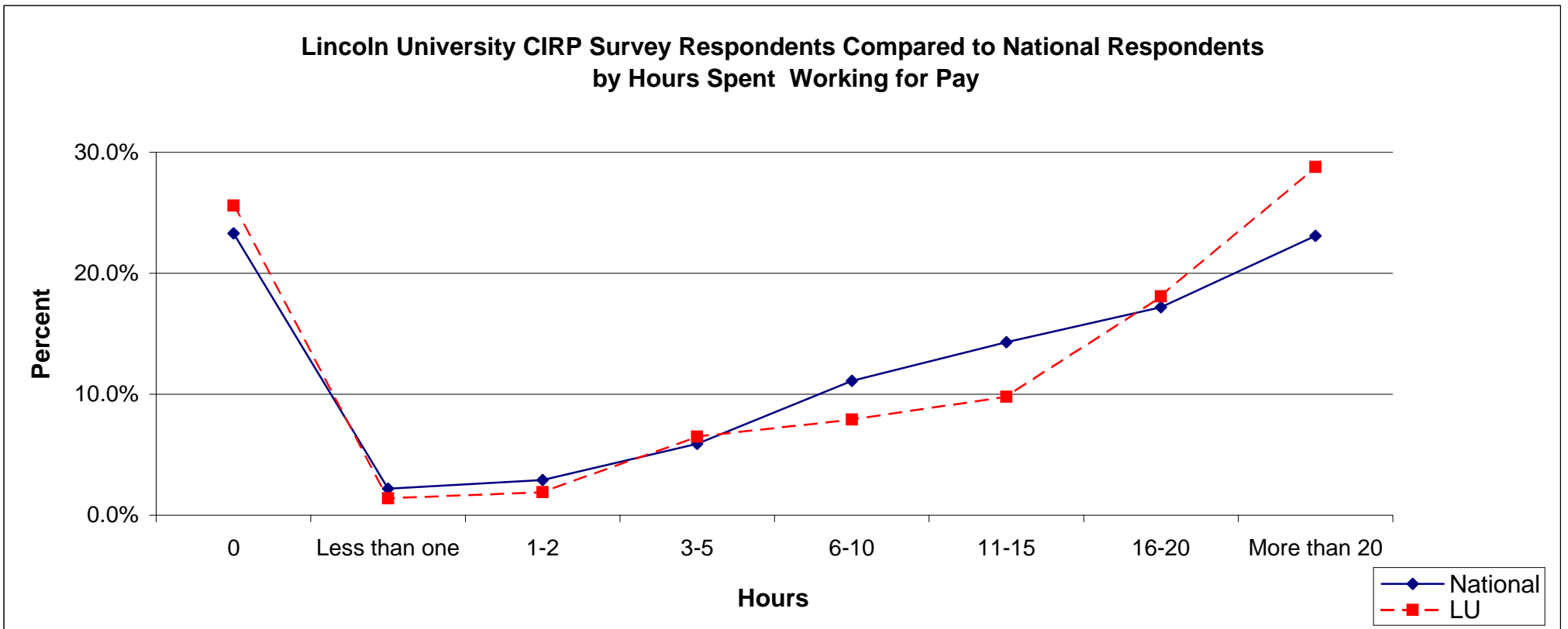

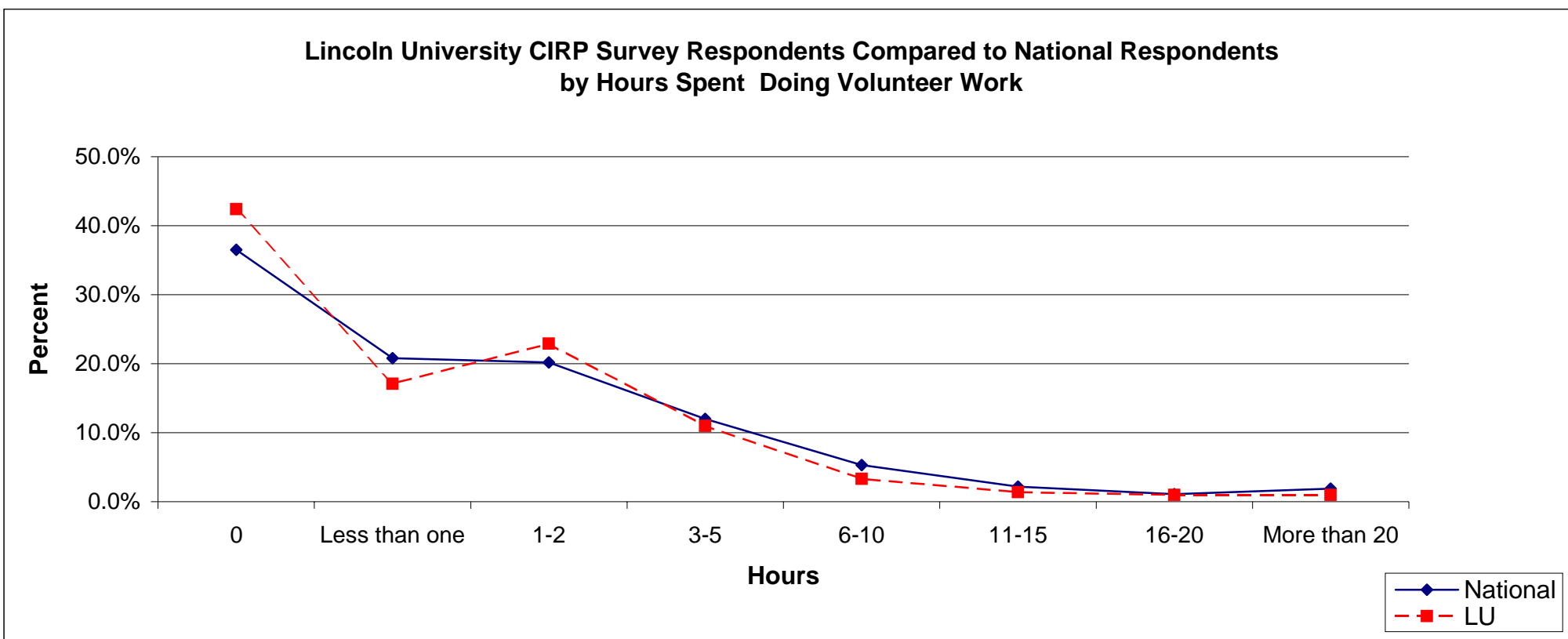

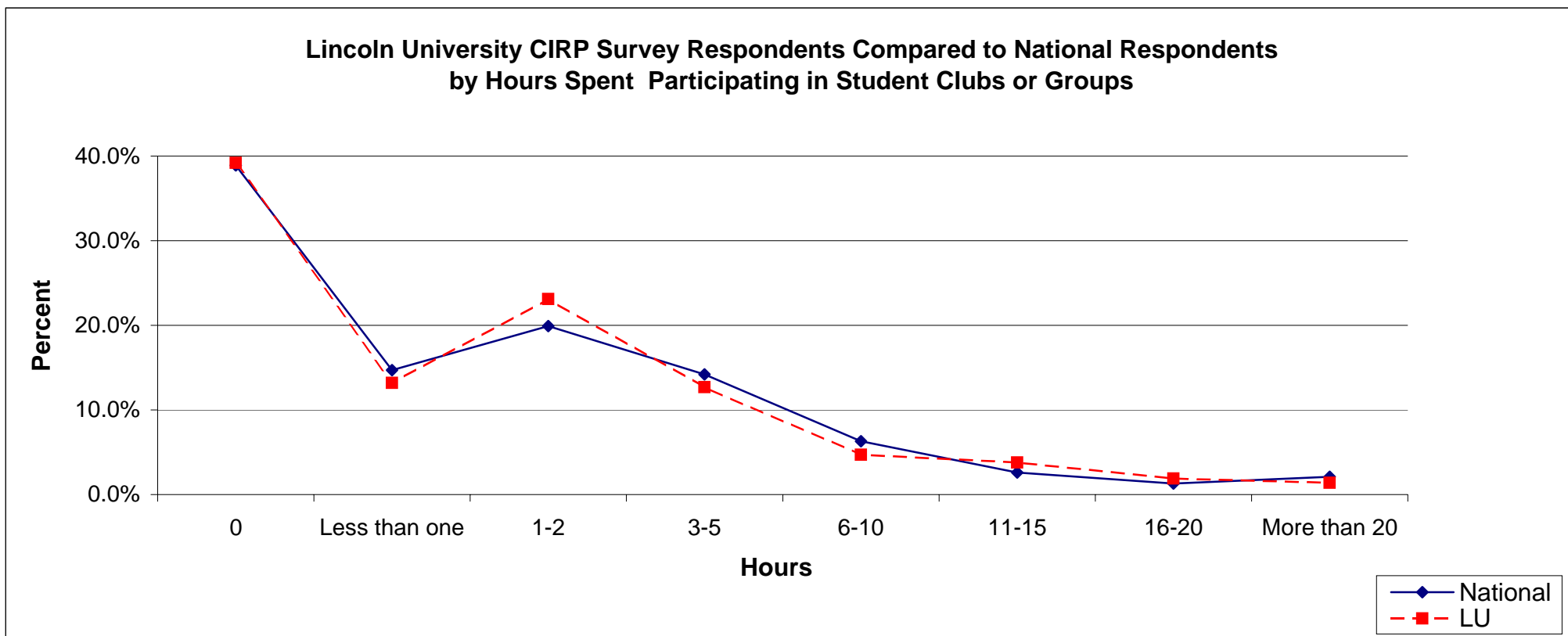

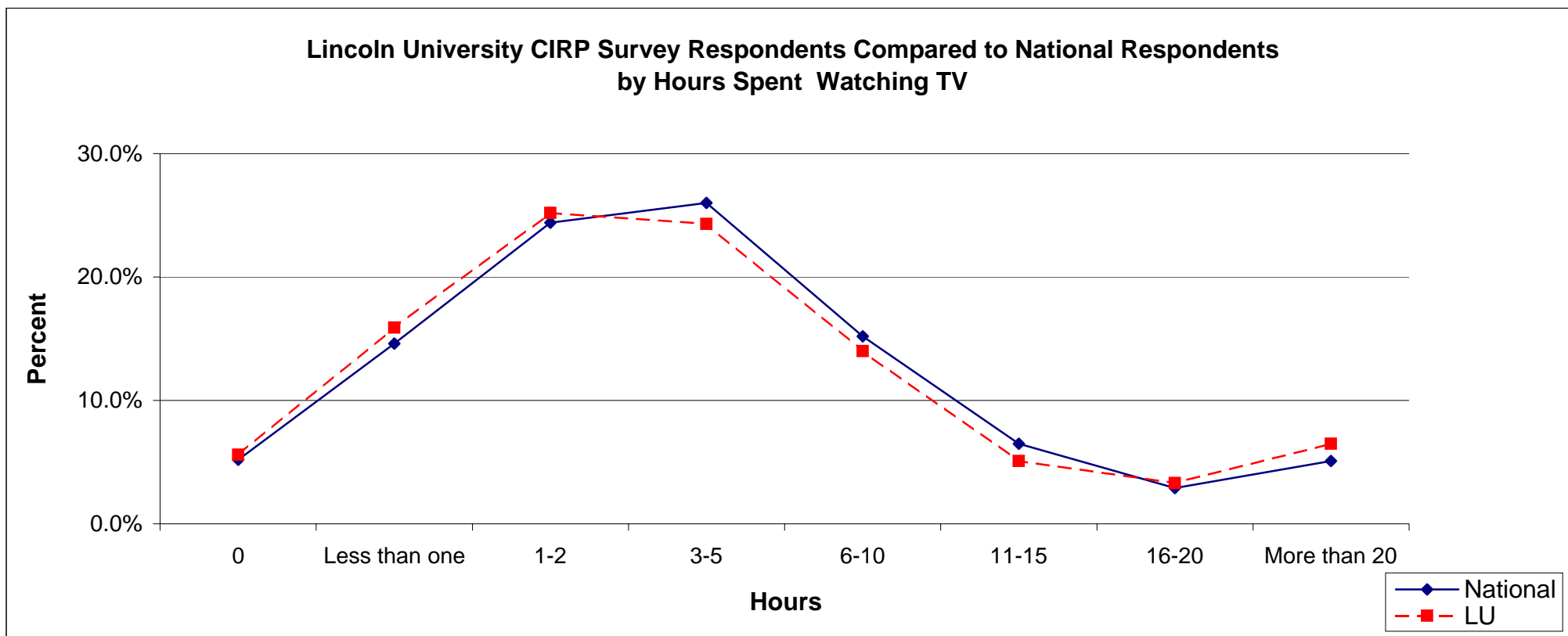

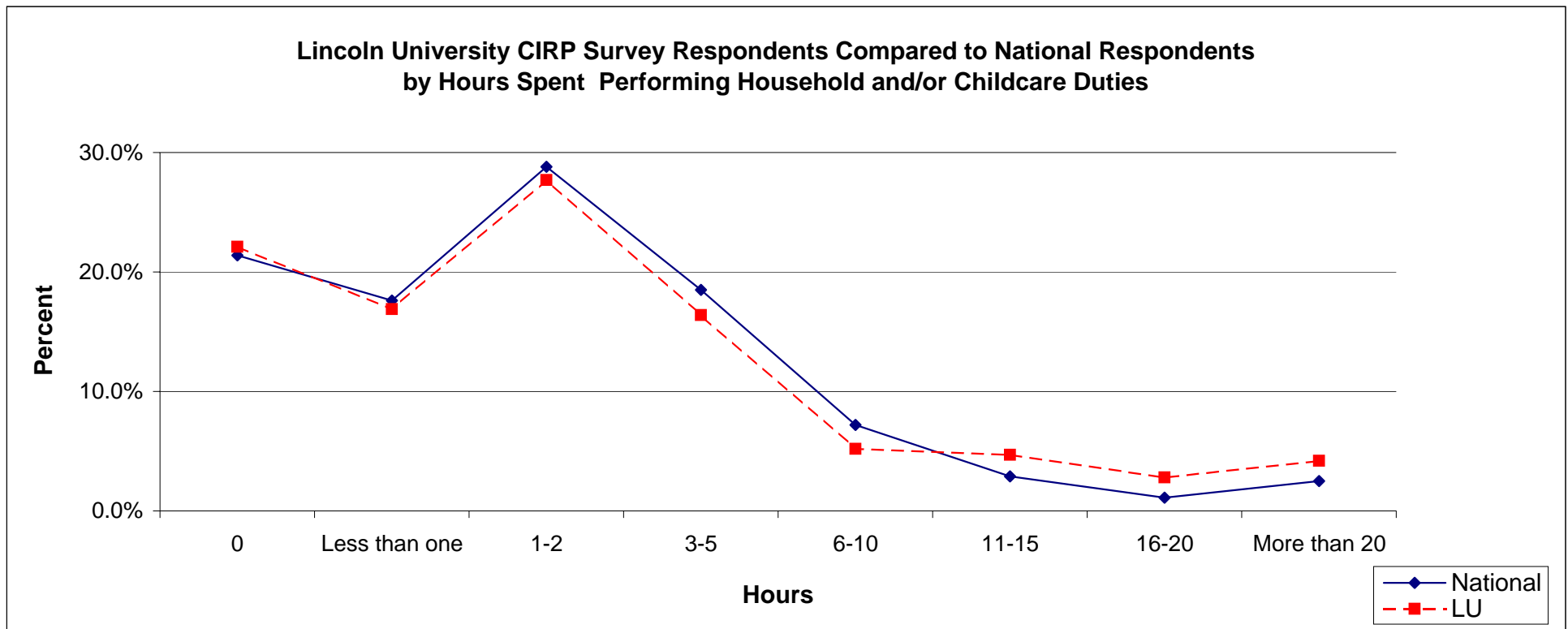

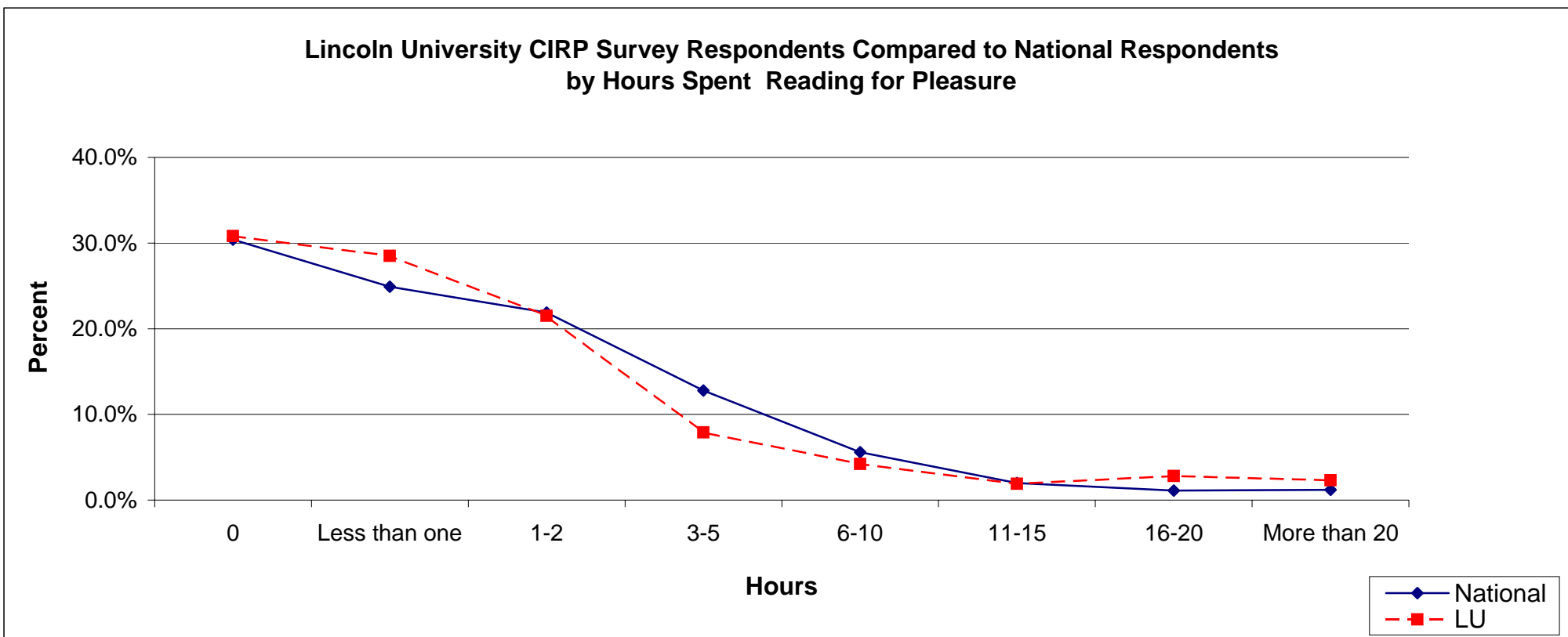

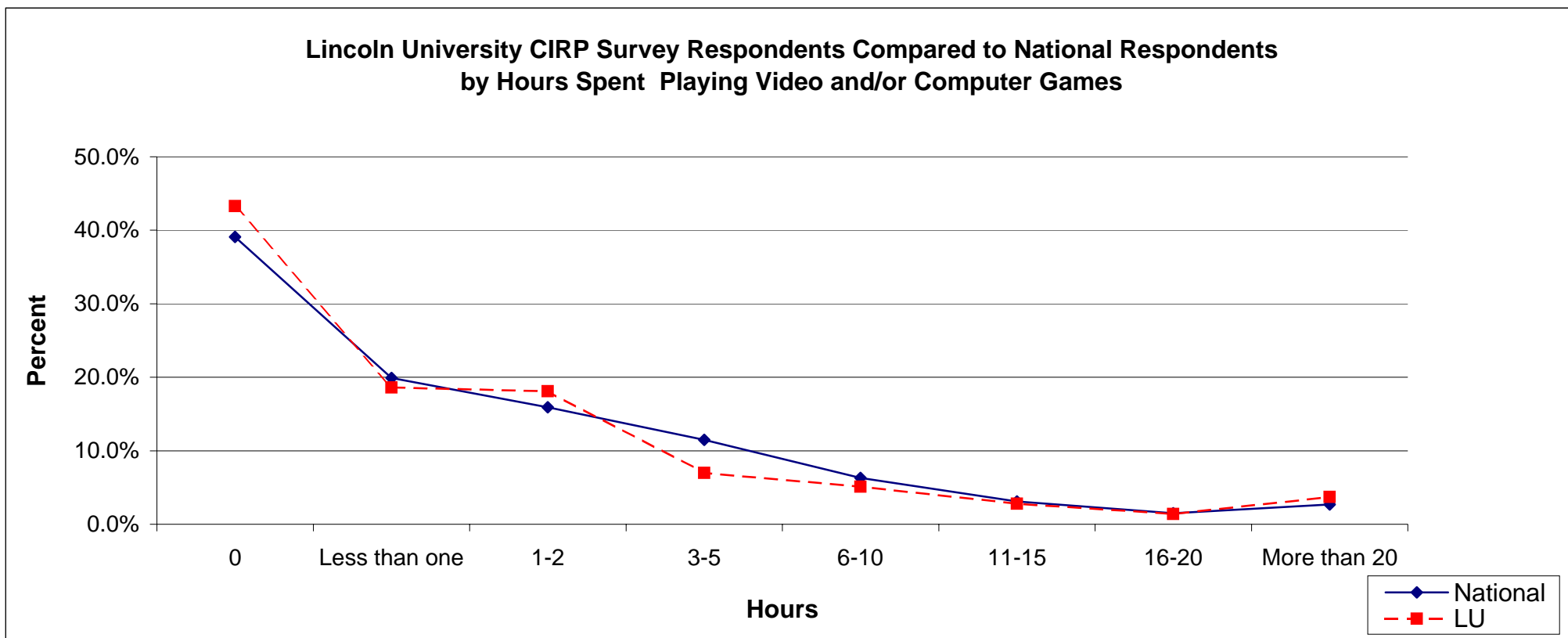

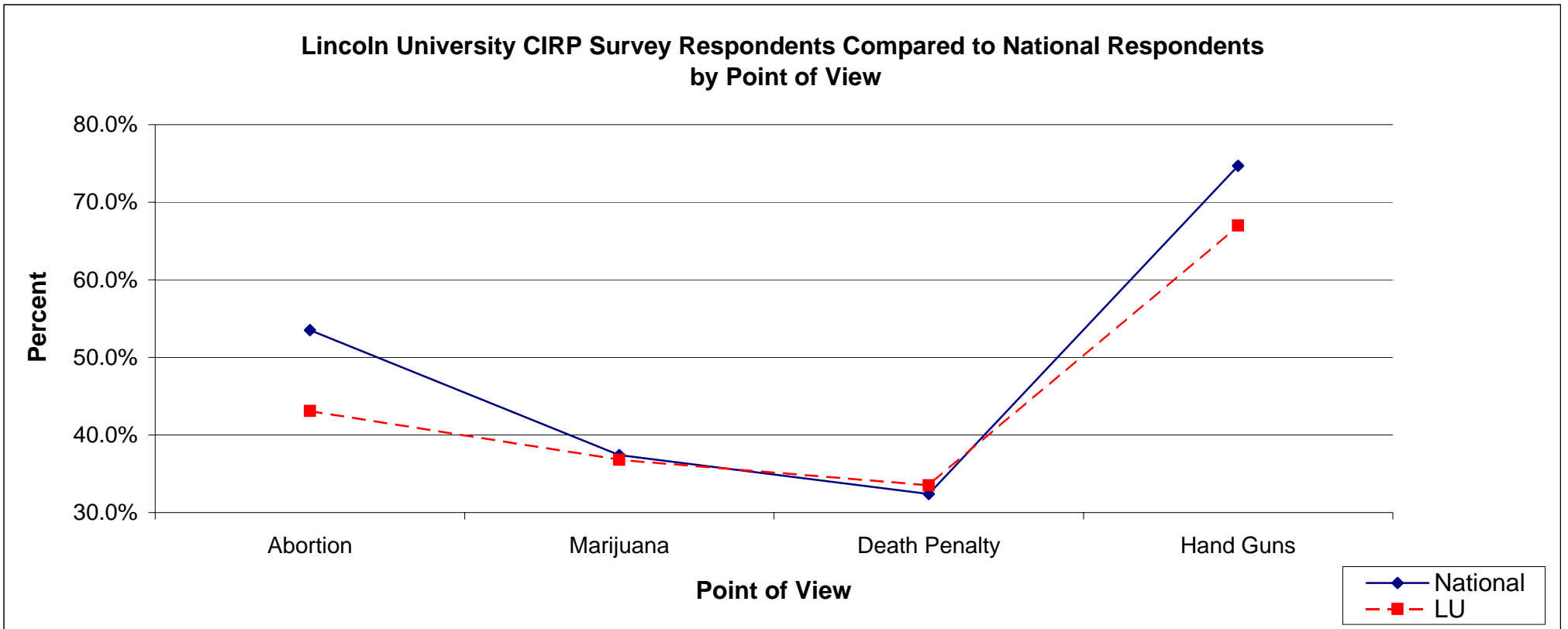

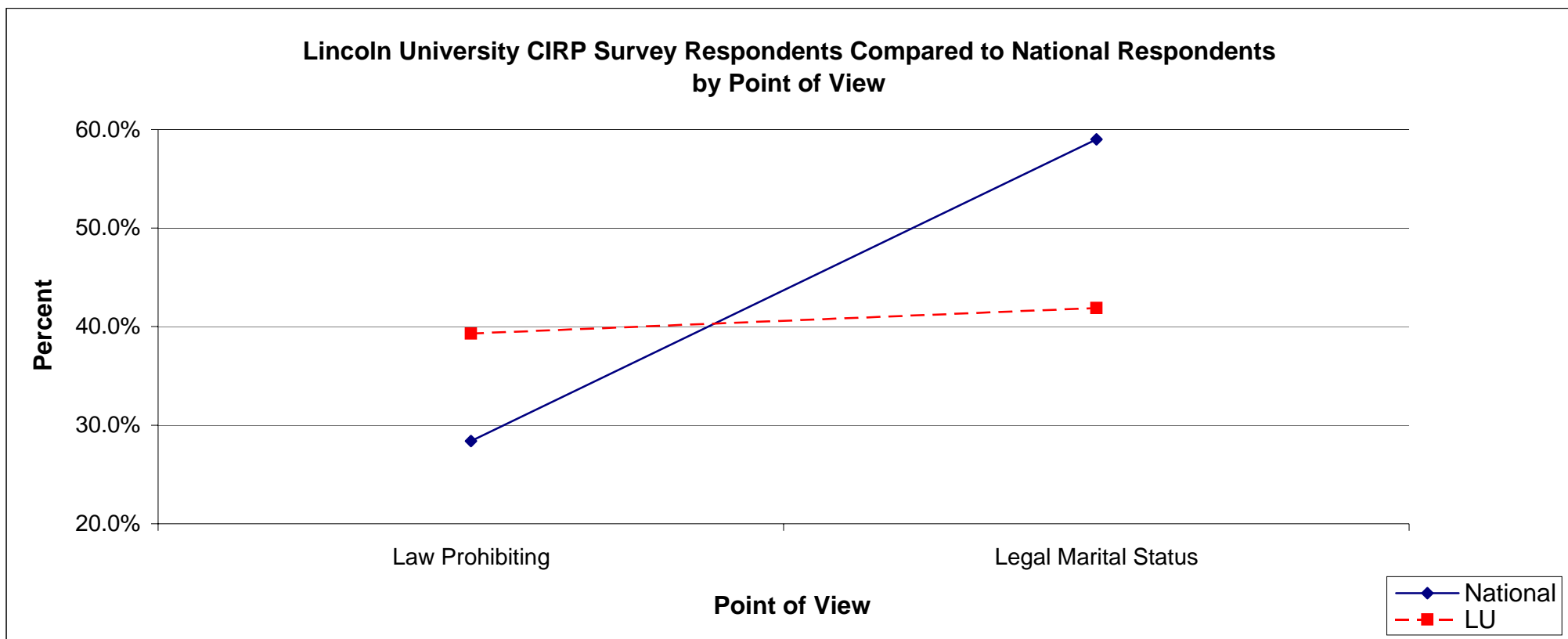

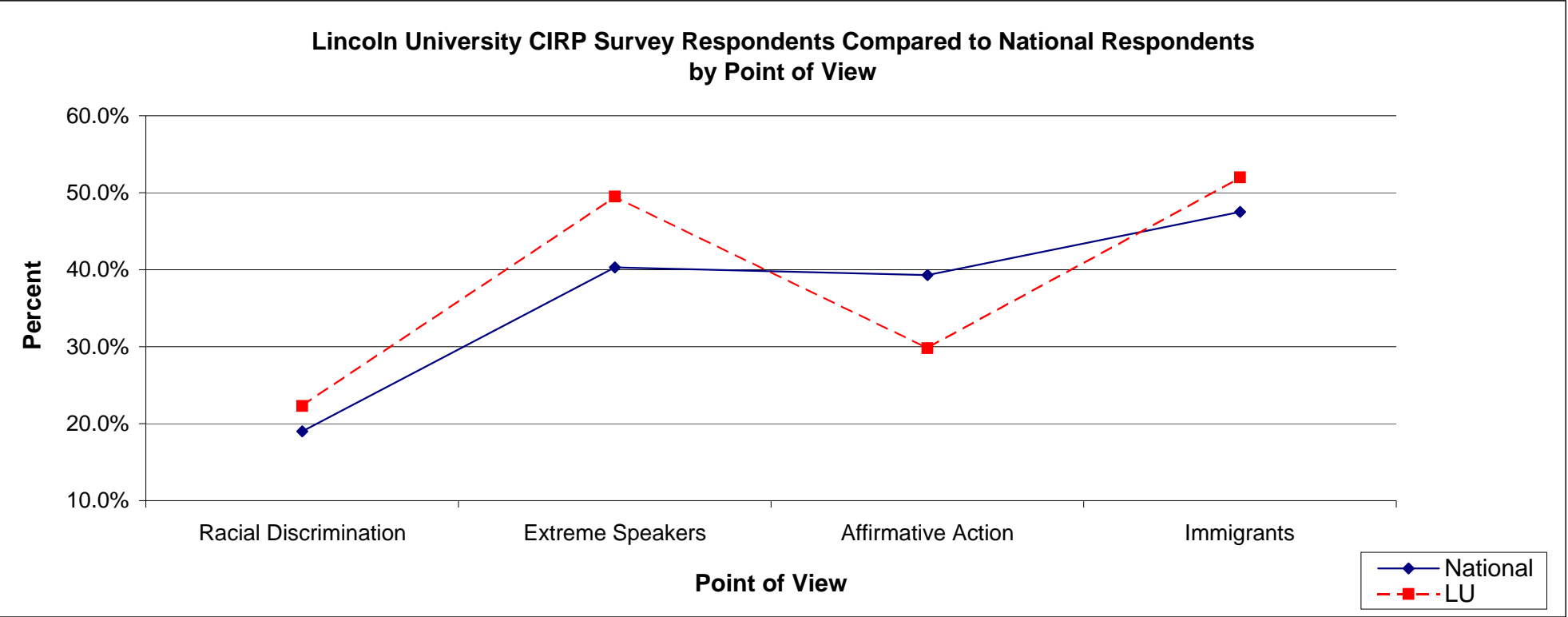

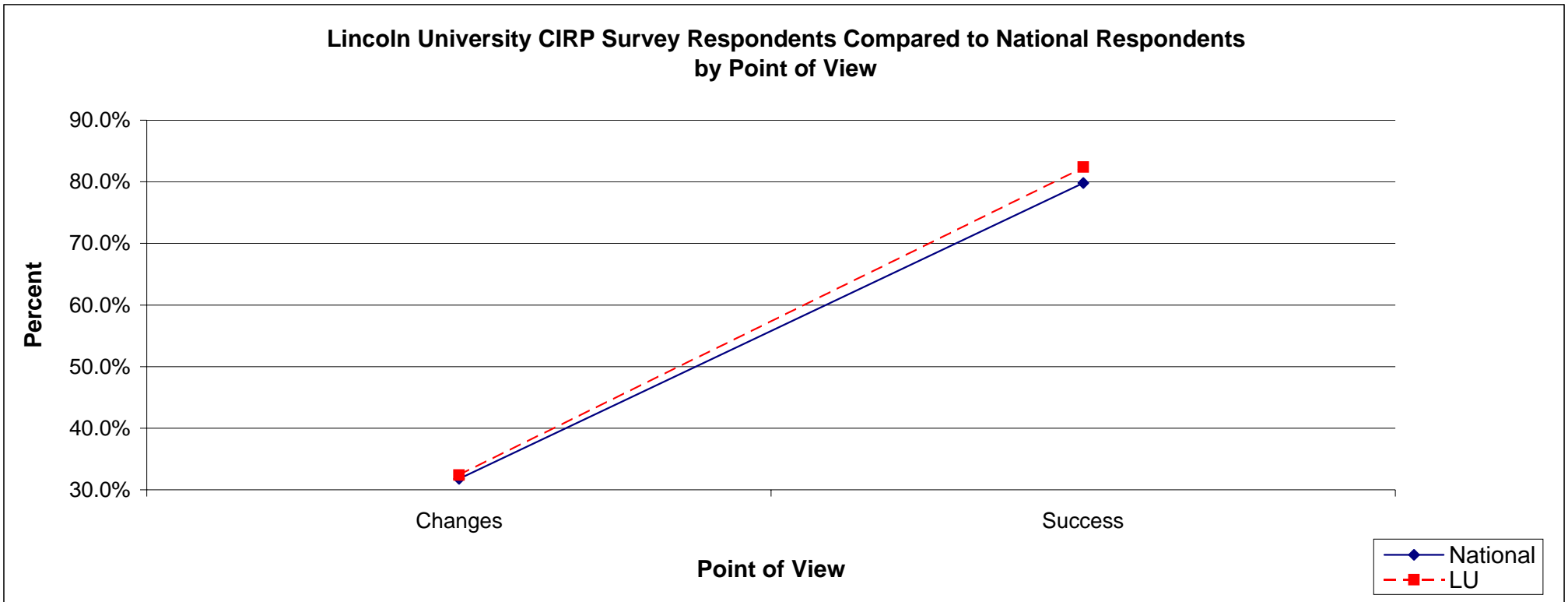

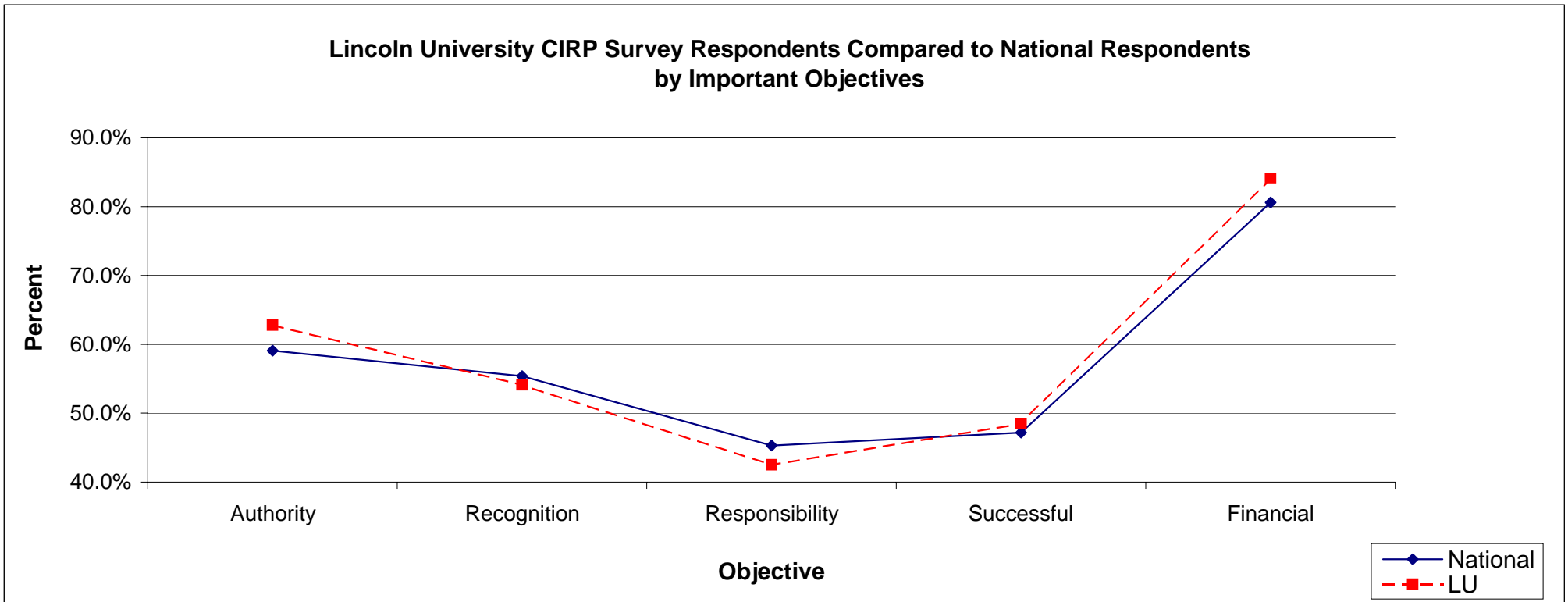

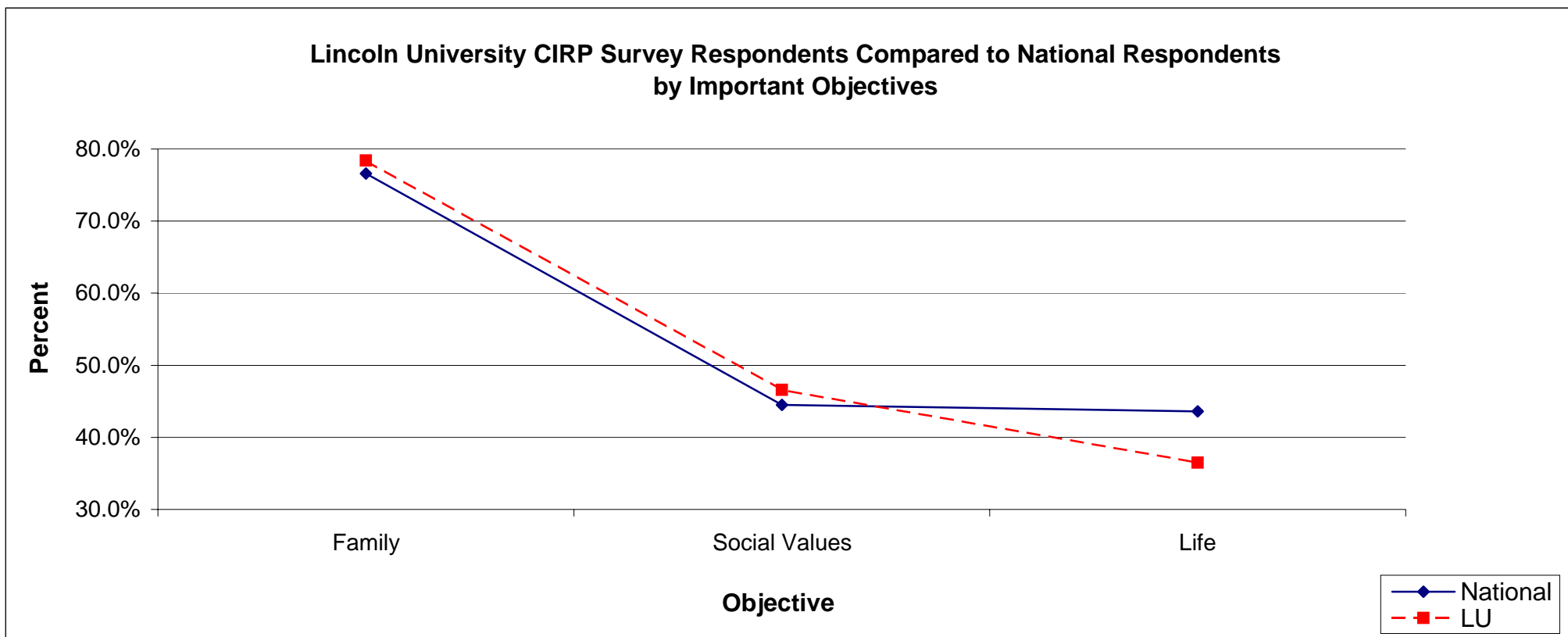

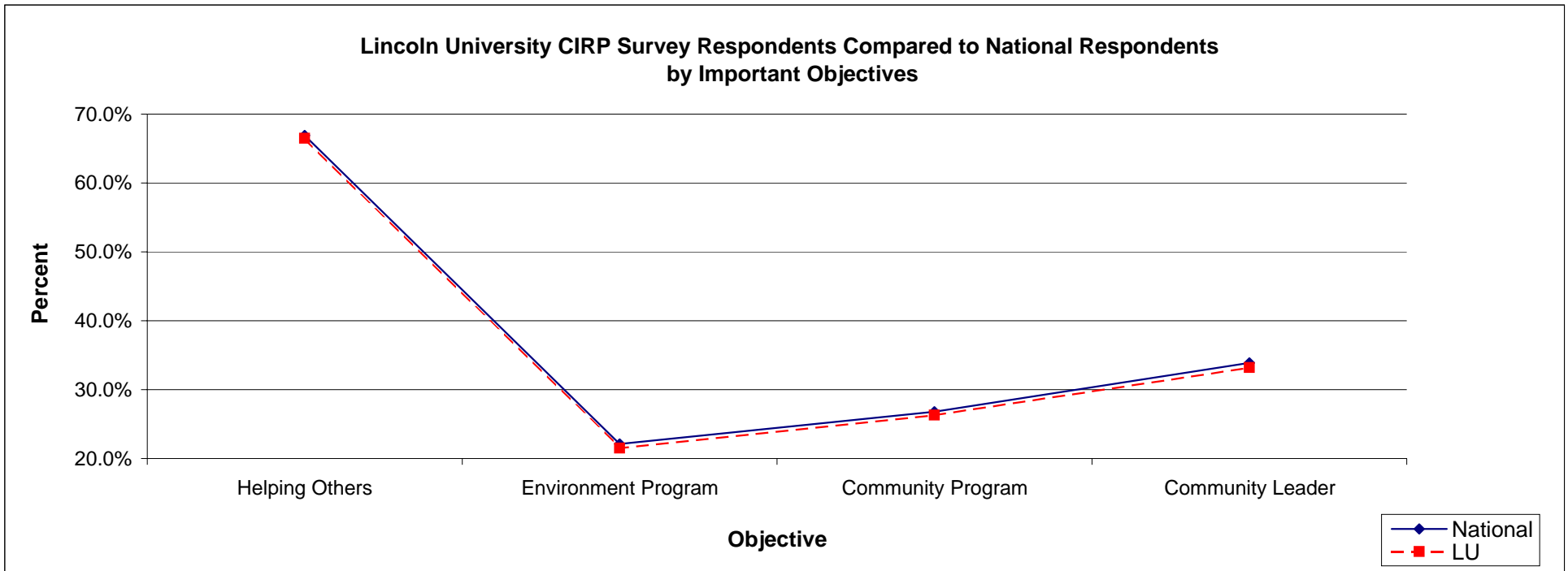

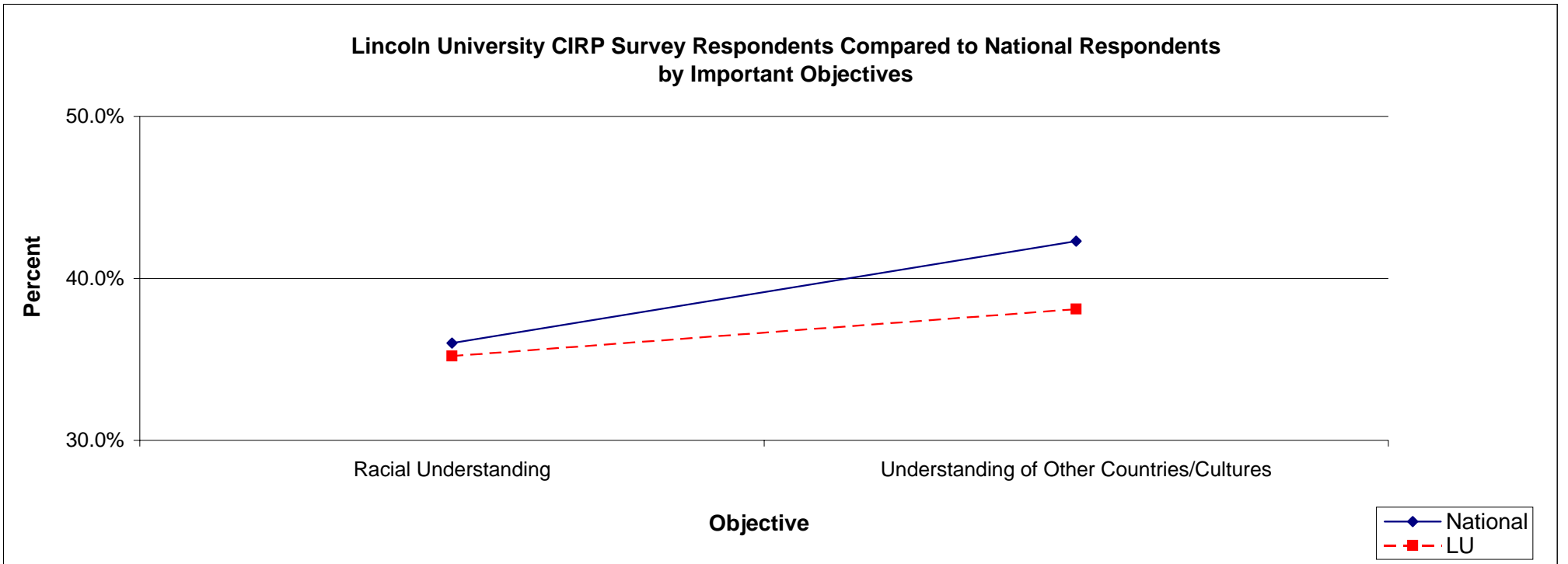

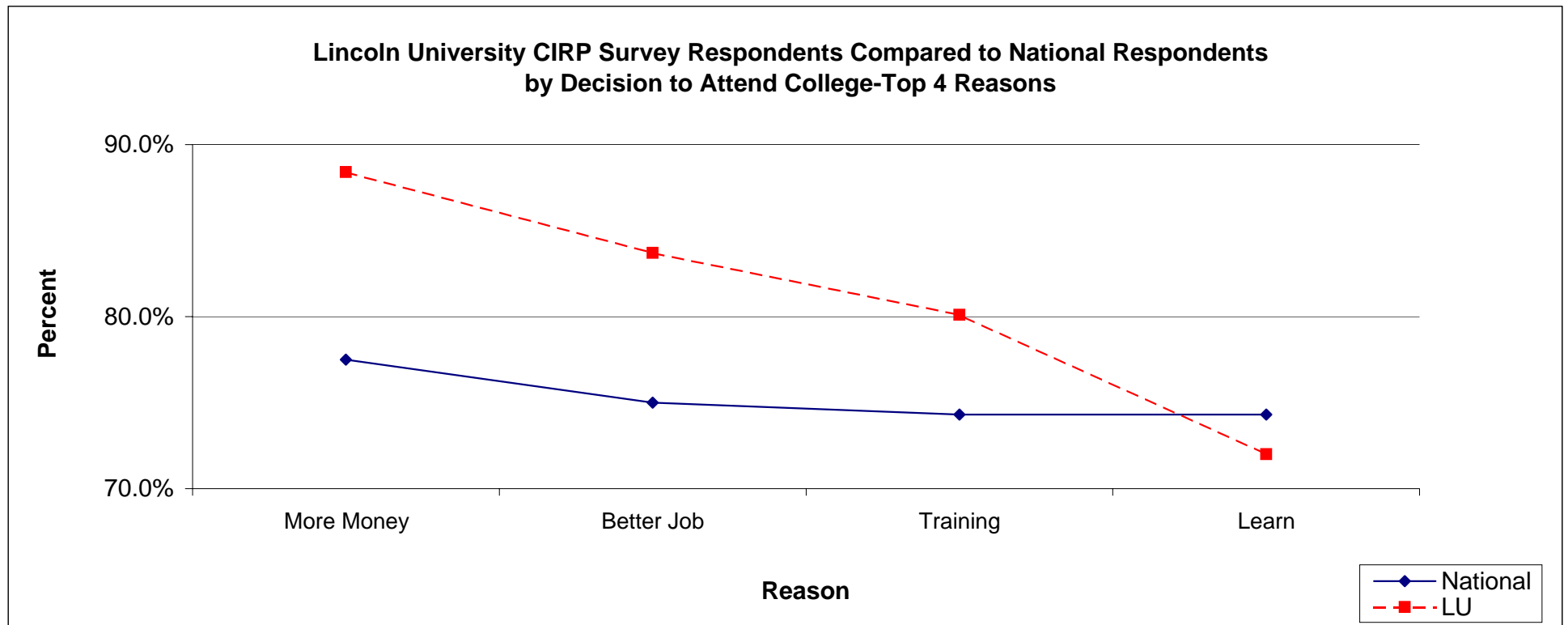

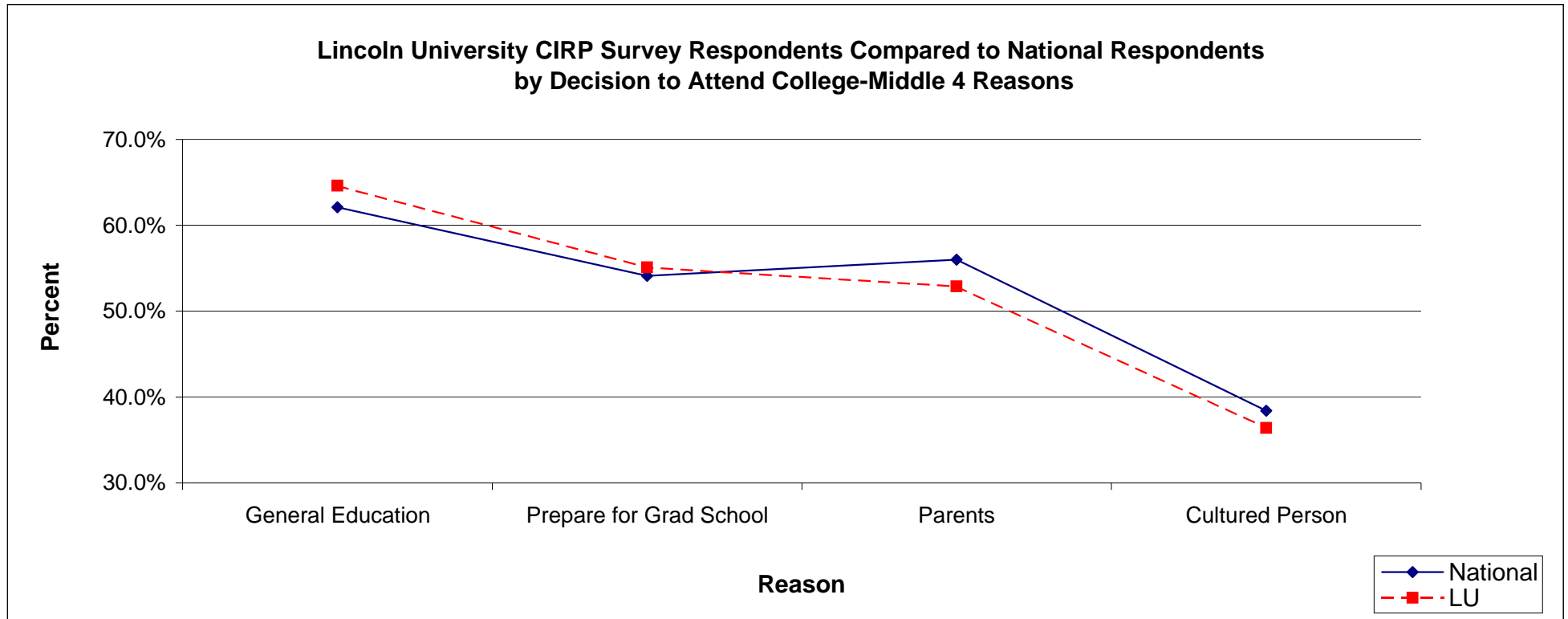

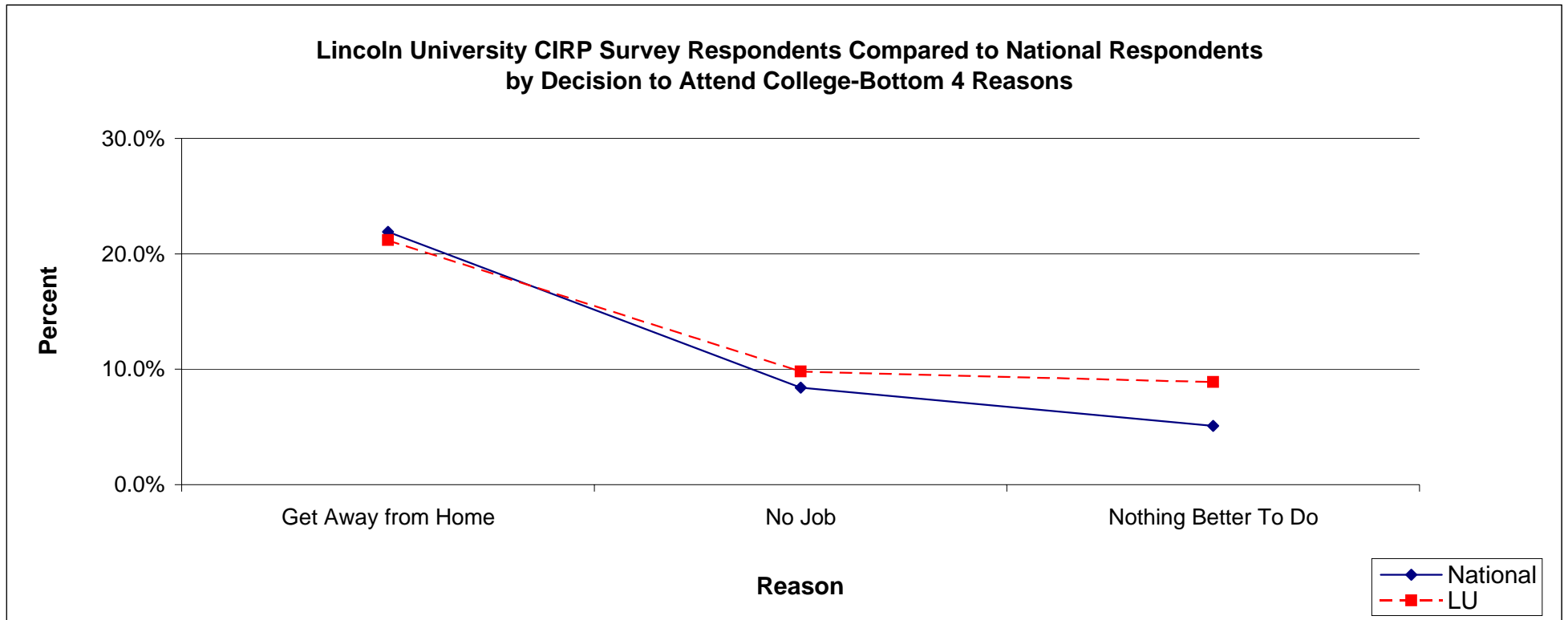

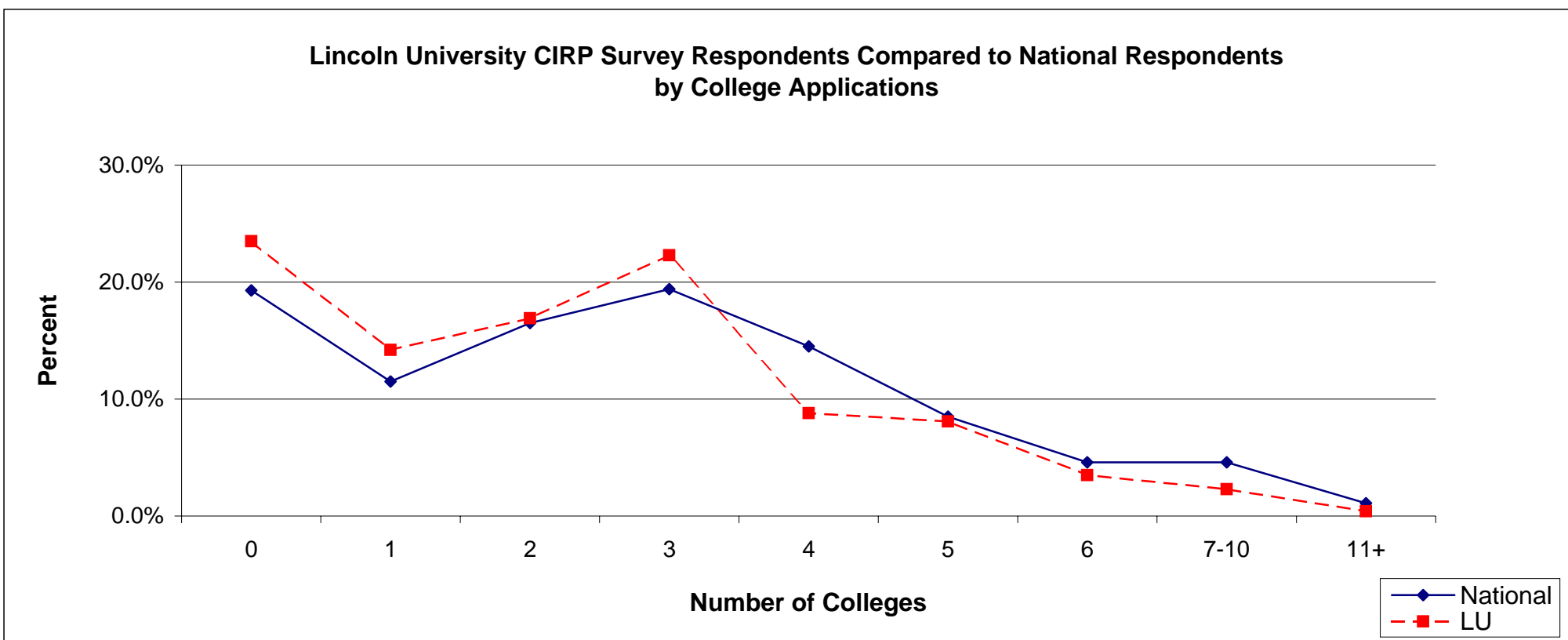

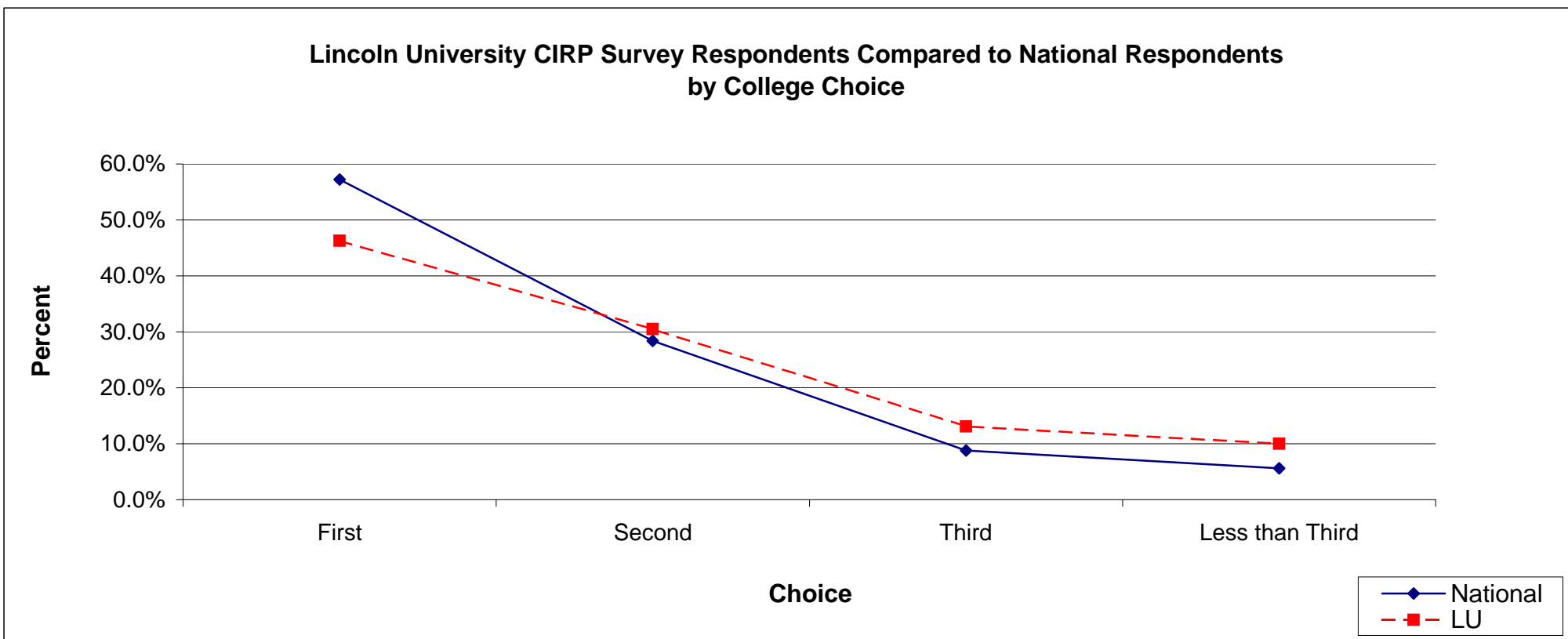

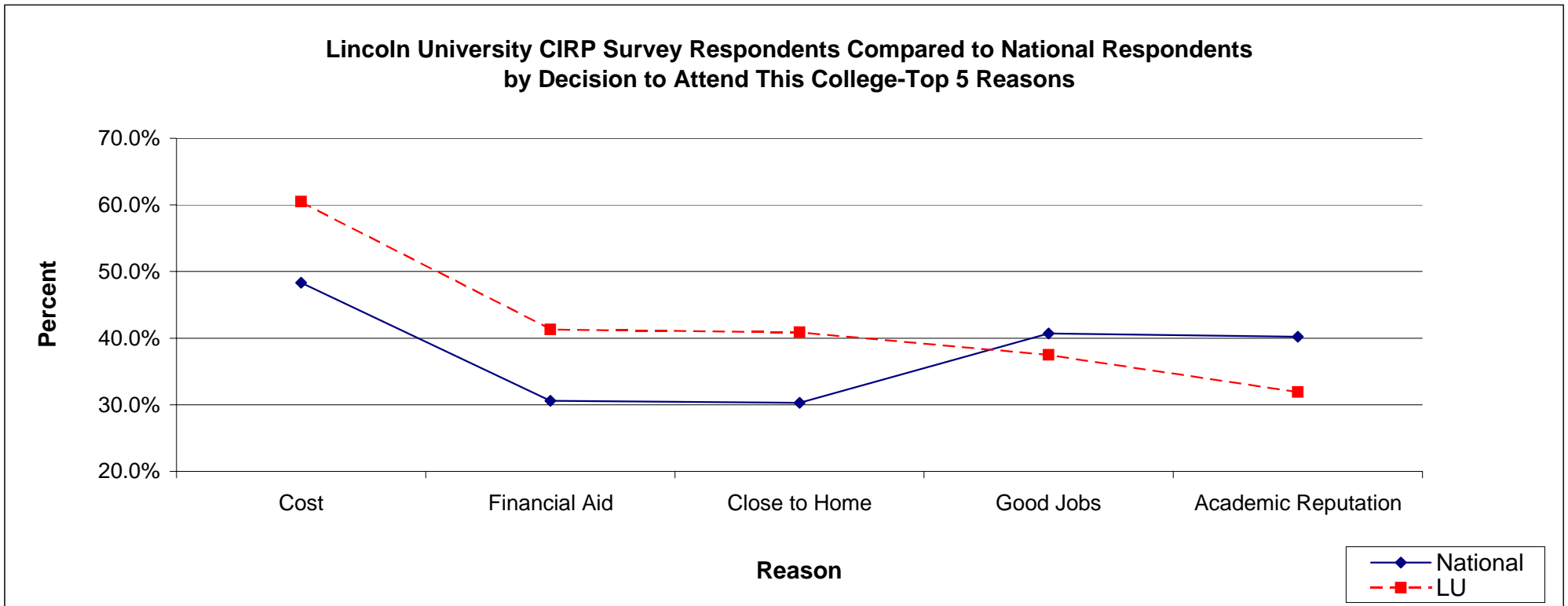

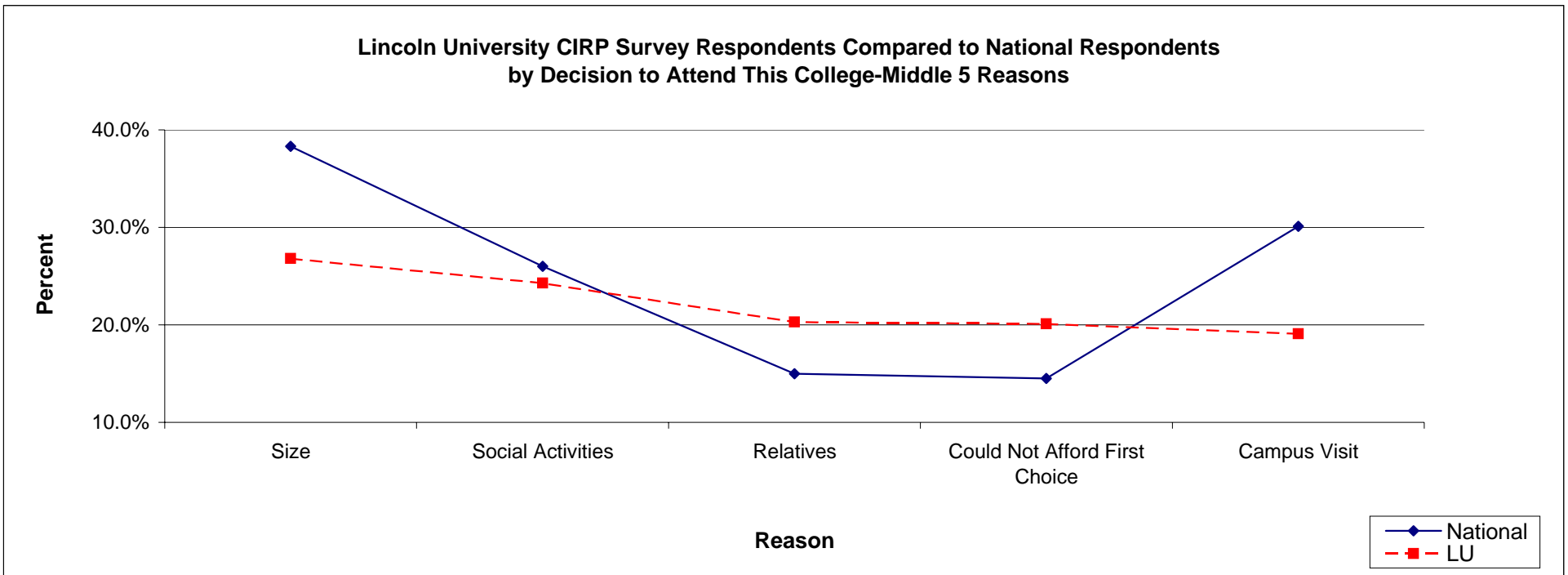

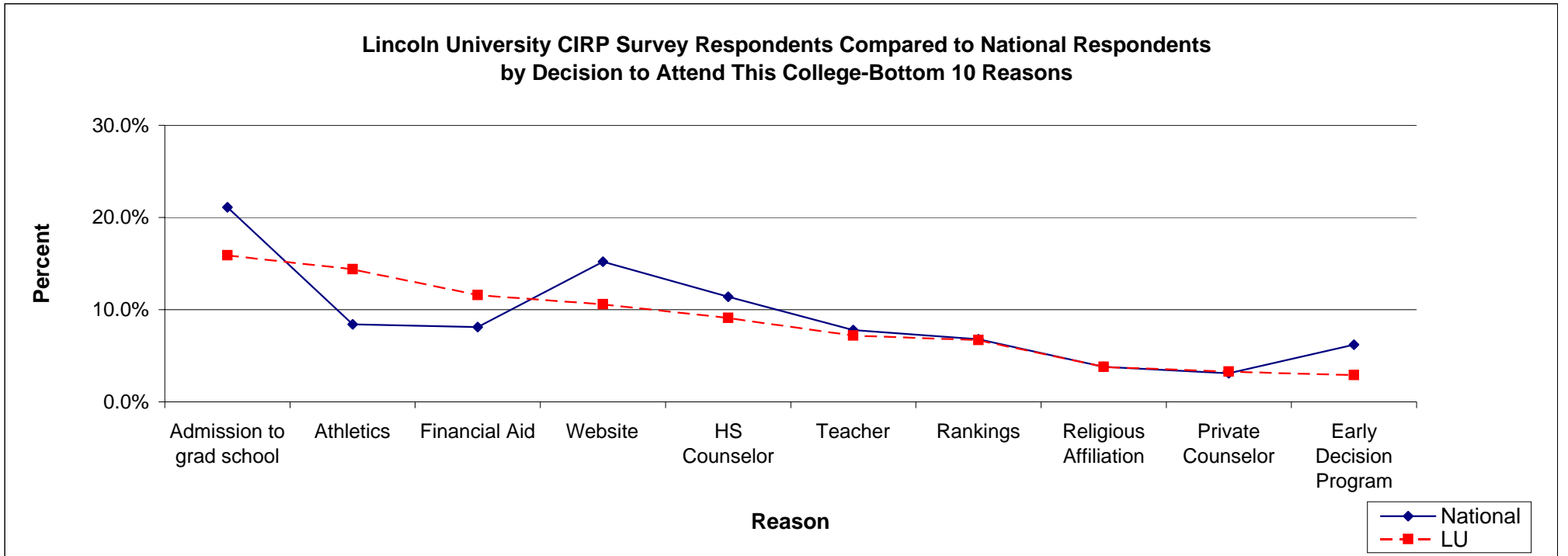

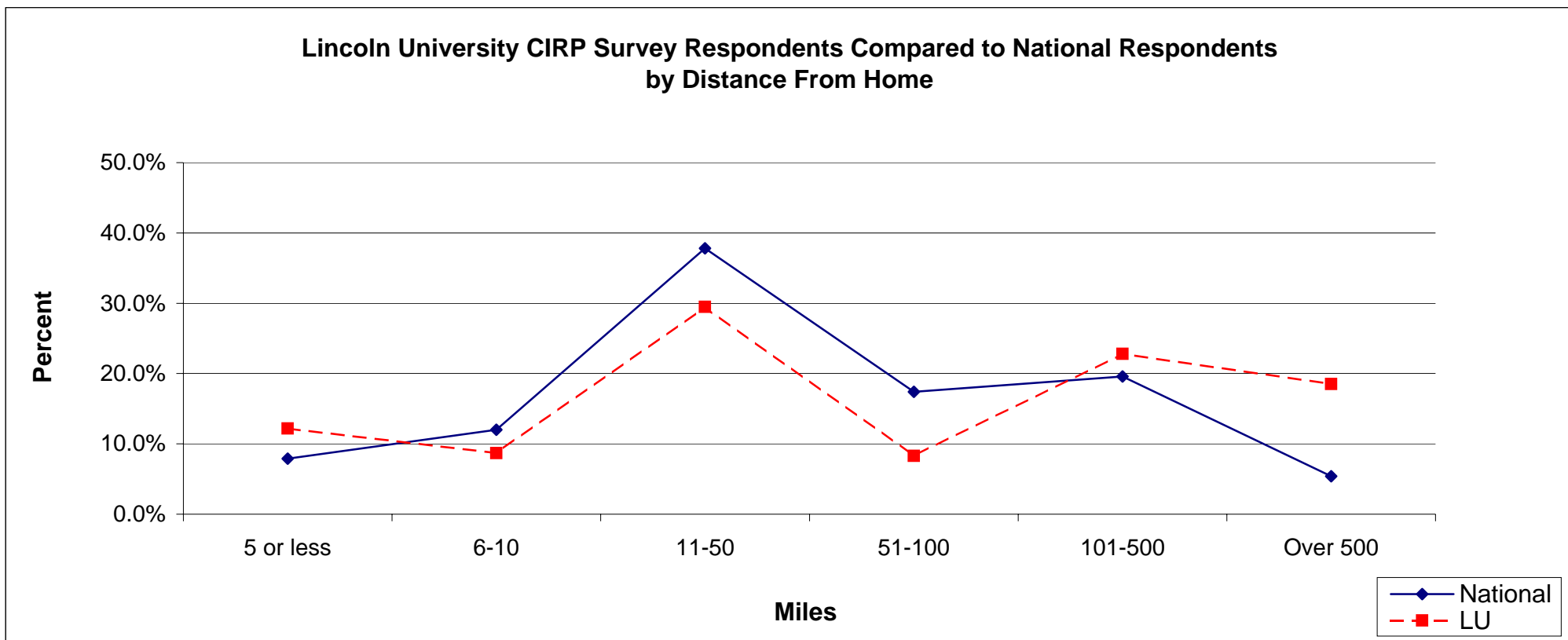

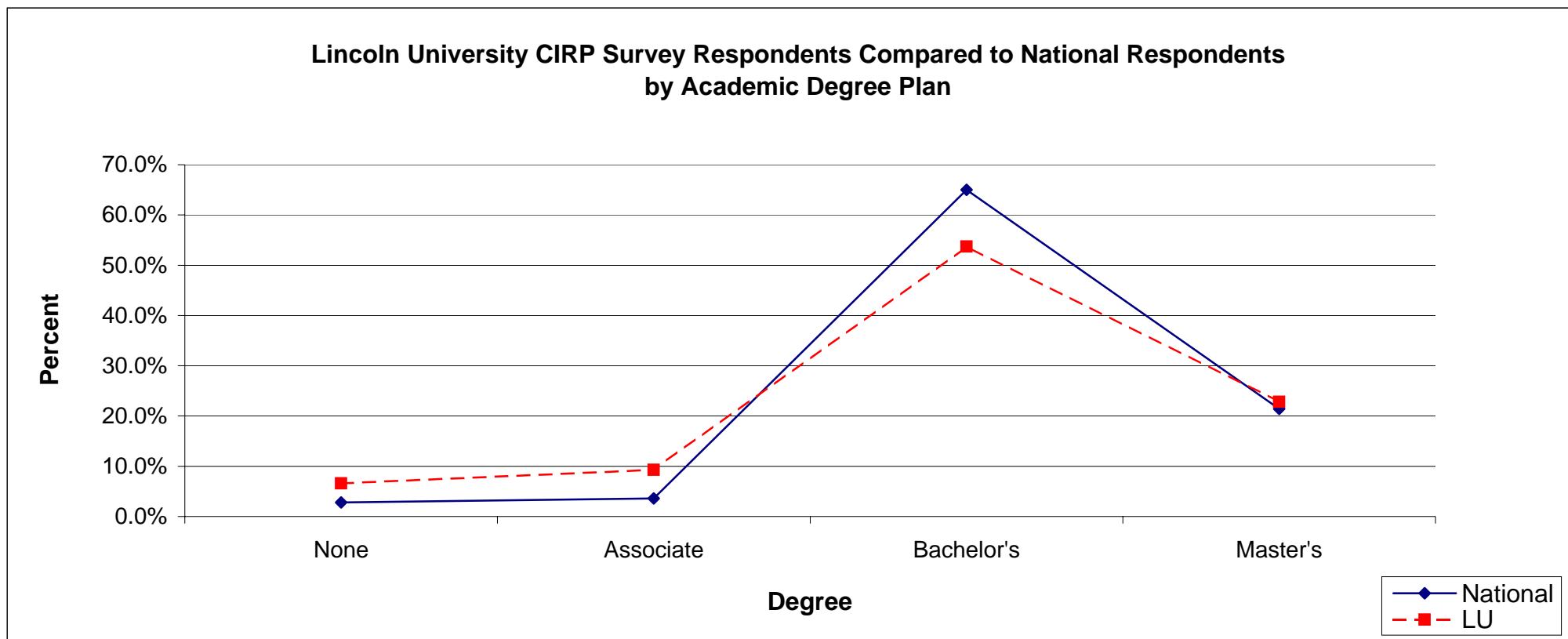

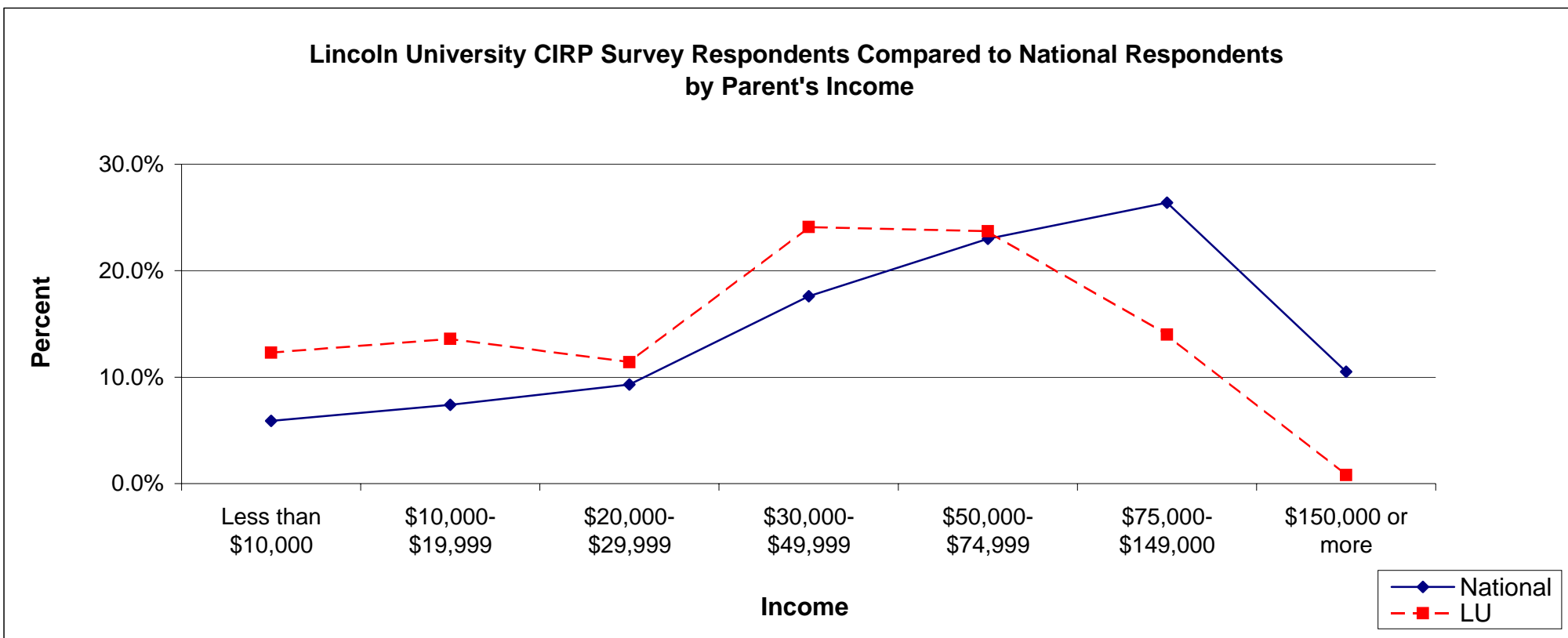

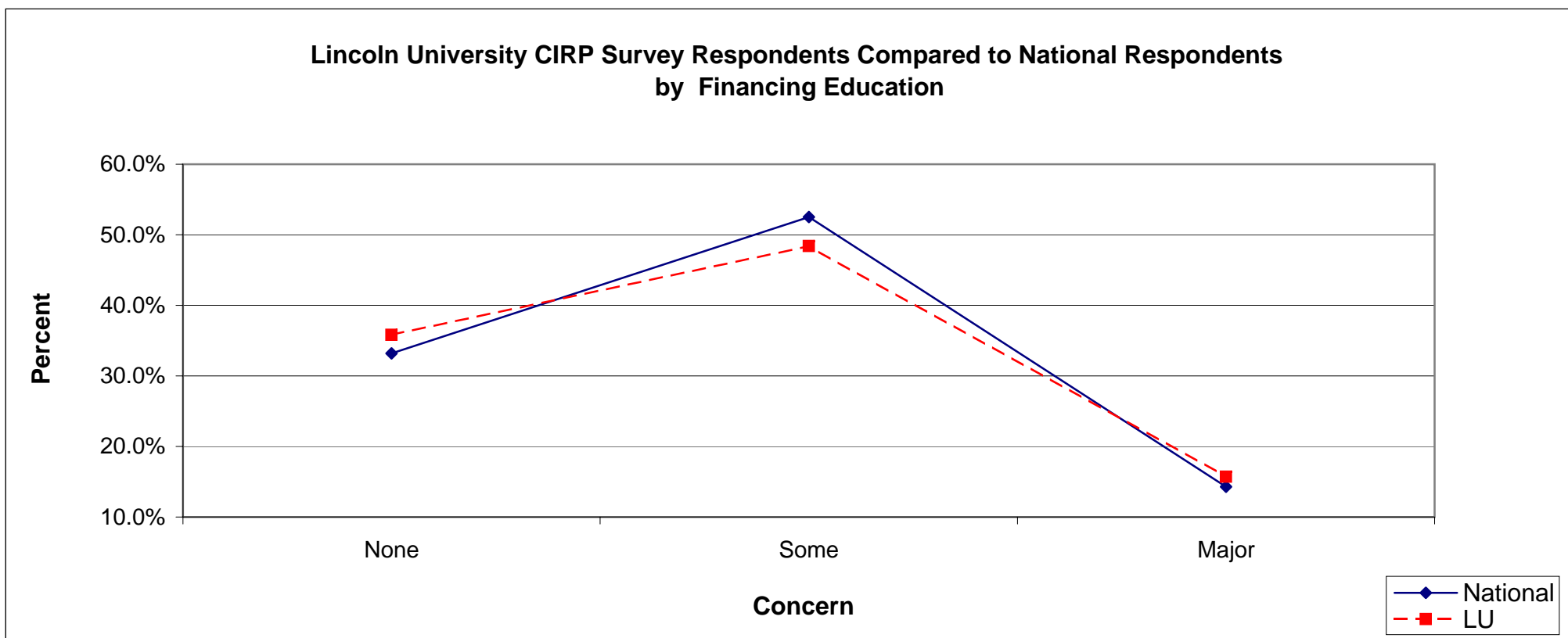
