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
Lincoln University

Set upon nearly 160 acres in Jefferson City, the state capital of Missouri, Lincoln University challenges and nurtures a diverse body of traditional and non-traditional students with a broad range of academic preparation and skills within a student-centered environment.

Lincoln University is a historically black, public, comprehensive, land-grant institution, founded in 1866 by the soldiers of the 62nd and 65th United States Colored Infantries at the close of the Civil War. The university's enrollment averages approximately 3,300 students from 36 states and over 30 countries.

Lincoln University offers seven undergraduate degrees in more than 50 areas of study, and graduate programs in selected disciplines that prepare our students to live confidently and successfully in their communities and the evolving global village.

The university provides a true college experience with opportunities for student involvement in academic bowls, fine and performance arts, on-campus radio and television studios, a student newspaper, student government, intercollegiate and intramural athletic teams and more than 50 organizations, including fraternities, sororities and social or service organizations. The university also is home to an active student union; up-to-date computer laboratories; a health services clinic and state-of-the-art campus library.



College of Agricultural and Natural Sciences

The College of Agricultural and Natural Sciences offers degree programs that provide students with a strong scientific background, enabling our graduates to hold jobs in a variety of fields including forensic science, pharmaceutical research, secondary education, clinical laboratory science and other cutting edge science fields such as nanotechnology, as well as in all aspects of agriculture, environmental sciences and agribusiness. As an 1890 land-grant institution, the College of Agricultural and Natural Sciences also includes two farm operations, George Washington Carver Farm and Alan T. Busby Farm. These farms primarily serve as field laboratories that have assisted in the support of beef cattle, sheep, goat, swine, plant and soil science and environmental science research.



The College of Arts and Letters includes the Department of English, Foreign Languages and Journalism, the Department of Visual and Performing Arts and the Department of History, Political Science and Philosophy, as well as the LU Honors Program. By majoring in a program with the Department of English, Foreign Languages and Journalism, students gain knowledge and skills necessary to embark on a professional career as a writer, editor or teacher or to function as a bilingual individual speaking French or Spanish. Students can hone their journalistic skills with hands-on learning at the campus television station, JCTV, our campus newspaper, the Clarion, or at the 2006 Black College Radio Station of the Year, KJLU-FM. Our Department of Visual and Performing Arts houses a music program that has been continuously accredited since 1948, as well as the LU Marching Musical Storm and the Lincoln University Vocal Ensemble; an art program that will prepare you to exhibit your works in a variety of adjudicated shows; and student-led theatre productions that will allow you to showcase your acting skills. If you wish to pursue a career that may involve decision making, writing and influencing people, then the Department of History, Political Science and Philosophy is for you.

College of Professional Studies



Pre-Professional Programs

Lincoln University offers opportunities to students who desire to pursue the study of medicine, dentistry, podiatry, optometry, pharmacy, veterinary medicine or law upon the successful completion of their bachelor's degree. Through careful planning with their pre-professional advisor, a student can complete pre-professional requirements while simultaneously satisfying their degree requirements.

Pre-Medical; Pre-Dental; Pre-Podiatry; Pre-Optometry

The university is prepared to provide adequate training for students wishing to enter into the medical, dental, podiatry or optometry fields. Students wishing to enter professional schools to study these disciplines upon completion of their bachelor's degree will undertake a heavy concentration of chemistry, biology and physics courses. Students do not necessarily need to major in one of these fields prior to applying for professional school admission; however they should plan to pursue a course of study which will give them a broad scientific background. Pre-professional advisors from the College of Agricultural and Natural Sciences will guide the students through their course of study.

Pre-Pharmacy

Students wishing to earn their doctor of pharmacy degree should be prepared to study at the undergraduate and graduate level for at least six years. Pre-pharmacy students at Lincoln University should follow the course of study for chemistry majors for the first two years of study, in addition to coursework in biology and social/behavioral sciences in order to best prepare themselves for the Pharmacy College Admission Test (PCAT), which is required for entry into a doctor of pharmacy program

Pre-Veterinary Medicine

A strong high school background in biology, chemistry, mathematics and physics is highly beneficial for students interested in pursuing veterinary medicine as a career. Undergraduate students are encouraged to take courses in chemistry, physics and biology, as well as in English, mathematics and social/behavioral sciences. Non-academic activities are also important criteria for acceptance into veterinary medical school, including a minimum of 40 hours of observance of veterinarian(s) actively engaged in clinical work.

Pre-Law

Students wishing to enter law school are encouraged to pursue a minor in legal studies, which is designed as a cross-disciplinary effort between the areas of public administration, criminal justice and political science. By completing the legal studies minor, students will gain an understanding of the basic areas of the American legal system as well as developing areas of interest in specialty areas of law. LSAT prep is also offered each year to our pre-law students.



Admissions

Lincoln University admits students who may benefit from and contribute to its educational programs, regardless of age, race, creed, sex, color, religion, national origin or handicap. The university tries to provide each applicant the opportunity for a college education. We maintain that access to higher education is both a right and a privilege, and our students discover an environment that is both challenging and constructive.

To be considered for admission, applicants must complete an application for undergraduate admissions no later than July 15 (fall semester applicants). Students are encouraged to complete the online application at www.lincolnu.edu/web/admissions/apply-now. In addition, applicants must submit official high school and/or college transcripts, ACT or SAT scores (as appropriate) and a non-refundable application fee for full consideration for admission to LU.

Financial Aid

Approximately 82% of Lincoln University students receive financial assistance. Our financial aid programs provide monetary assistance to students who would not otherwise be able to pursue an education. Financial assistance is awarded on the basis of both need and academic qualifications, and should be viewed as supplementary to what a student's family can afford.

To qualify for need-based financial assistance, which includes grants, loans and work-study, the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) must be completed. The FAFSA can be obtained at www.fafsa.gov. To receive maximum consideration for this type of financial assistance, the FAFSA must be submitted by April 1. Our school code for the FAFSA is 002479.

A limited number of academic scholarships are also available, and these are awarded on the basis of scholastic merit. To be considered for an institutional academic scholarship, a student must have been accepted to Lincoln University no later than February 1. No additional scholarship application is required. Academic scholarships are awarded to the most qualified students first as long as funds are available.

Residential Life


