Holocaust Museum Shaare Emeth Synagogue St. Louis, MO

Wednesday, February 26, 2014

<u>Note</u>: Members enrolled in Dr. Cain's Holocaust course will be given first choice to register for this trip. The trip represents the fourth session of the course; Dr. Cain will accompany the group to St. Louis. After January 15, 2014, if space is available, the trip will be open to all LIR members.

The Holocaust Museum and Learning Center houses a 5,000 square foot core exhibit providing a chronological comprehensive history of the Holocaust with personal accounts of survivors who emigrated to the St. Louis area. A Holocaust survivor will speak to our group about their personal experiences.

We will also Visit Shaare Emeth Synagogue in Ladue where a member of the congregation will explain the sanctuary, Jewish Holidays, and the four basic movements in Judaism in the U.S.

The structure, of dramatic and transformational design, allows the museum to display far more of its collections. The Mennonite Community April 23, 2014

Join your LIR friends for a trip through Missouri's scenic countryside with a visit to the Mennonite community in Versailles and the Excelsior area. We will, however, get to travel by coach, not horse and buggy.

Our trip begins at the historic 1860's Morgan County Hotel, one of the oldest structures in Morgan County. The hotel guest register includes signatures of Civil War soldiers who stopped for room and board, many with an I.O.U. following their name. We'll also tour their museum which includes a barber shop, weaving room, war relics room, beauty parlor and much more.

From there our step-on guide, a member of the Old Order Mennonites, will take us through some of the many historic shops in the area, to include a clock shop, fabric shop, book store, harness shop and the ever popular Weaver's Country Market. We will also have the opportunity to visit a school and the Excelsior Mennonite Church.

Lunch will be served buffet style at Lehman's Family Restaurant, a well-known and favorite eatery among the local community.

<u>"Sweet Alabama" – Yesterday and Today</u> May 13, 14, 15, 16, 2014

From a small cotton town to the leader in the Space Race, the city of Huntsville at the foothills of the Appalachian Mountains in North Alabama, is equally at home in the 19th Century or the 21st. Huntsville tourist attractions repeat the heritage of Alabama's first English speaking city, the strife of the Civil War, and the accomplishments of America's rocket scientists. Come experience Antebellum to Antigravity –only found in Huntsville- with friendly LIR travelers!

In addition to spot-lighting this diverse Alabama city, we also visit several Tennessee attractions. Jack Daniel's Distillery,

Lynchburg, dates back to the 1860's, the nation's oldest distillery. The charcoal mellowing process was originally perfected here more than a century ago. The Belle Meade Plantation near Nashville, originally a 5,400 acre working plantation, was well known as a Thoroughbred Farm, producing many Kentucky Derby winners. In addition to the onsite 1853 Greek Revival Mansion, the property includes a winery, carriage house displaying antique carriages, 1790 log cabin, smokehouse, and an 1840 mausoleum and creamery.

Day 1 - Enjoy the spring foliage as we travel South to Nashville, Tennessee for the night.

Day II – Just two hours away from Nashville, arriving in Huntsville we meet our tour guide for a narrated <u>City Tour</u> which includes historic districts, a stop at the Historic Weeden House Museum and a visit to the Harrison Brothers Hardware Store (circa 1879).

Following lunch in the downtown area, we're off to the <u>US Space</u> <u>and Rocket Center</u>, recognized as one of the most comprehensive U.S. manned space flight hardware museums in the world. The vast museum features approximately 150 space artifacts. Lodging tonight will be at Huntsville Embassy Suites.

Day III – Following a continental breakfast at the hotel we visit the **Huntsville Botanical Gardens**, a beautiful 120 acre site with stunning collections, inviting woodland paths and broad grassy meadows; it is home to the nation's largest open-air butterfly house.

A **<u>Riverboat Cruise</u>** follows on the Pickwick Belle, an authentic paddle wheel riverboat operating on Wheeler Lake on the Tennessee River. Lunch will be served on the riverboat with a guide narrating points of interest as we are "rollin" on the river".

Following the cruise, our coach will be waiting to begin our journey north with a stop in Lynchburg, Tennessee to tour the <u>Jack Daniels</u> <u>Distillery</u>. The distillery, the oldest registered distillery in the United States, averages 250,000 visitors each year. Every ounce of Jack Daniels Tennessee Whiskey is produced there, fed by the pure, iron-free cave water springs nearby. (No samples, it's a dry county).

Continuing north we stop for a restful night in Fairfield, TN.

Day IV –The final day of our trip begins with a tour of the <u>Belle</u> <u>Meade Plantation</u> located in Belle Meade, Tennessee , a southern plantation noted for its History, Horses and Hospitality.

Another exciting stop as we make our way home will be lunch at <u>Patti's 1880 Settlement</u>; it's always been Patti's 1880 Restaurant but now it is so much more. Located in the 'Land Between the Lakes' area, the restaurant serves over 350,000 people annually in a

little town of 350 people. Visitors come from all over for the great food, beautiful gardens and Patti's great southern hospitality. With their log cabin gift shops, animal park for viewing, streams, fountains and miniature golf, remote controlled boats, Patti's needed a meaningful name to describe it all....Lunch! (Those who traveled with us to Nashville, 2008 will surely remember Pattie's).

Bruce and Jan **Sassmann's Restoration Farm** is located in Osage County between Bland and Belle. The 124 acre farm offers peace, outstanding views and amazing fields of wildflowers surrounded by projects that include grassland, woodland and aquatic restoration as well as the restoration of an 85 year-old barn for educational programs. Jan and Bruce are always anxious to share their story, knowledge and experiences about land restoration.

Lunch will be at <u>White Mule Winery</u> located in the old community of Charlotte. Four acres of grapes surround the winery along with farm land, cattle and of course a pair of beautiful white mules. Come enjoy a little piece of country life.

Gasconade County Historical Society focuses on items related to Gasconade County and its residents. Display rooms tell the story of people, depict their homes and farms, clothing and tools, churches and schools. It tells the story of people who were involved in six wars, founded businesses, civic and social organizations and left a wonderful heritage of music, art and literature.

Before leaving Gasconade County we tour Martha & Tom's

Farm where raising cows, making cheeses, operating a B&B are all part of the action on the farm. Their daily operation recently became licensed meaning their cheese brand, **Cool Cow Cheese**, is now for sale at the farm. Here we enjoy a food-cheese-wine pairing adventure.

The Shoah ("Holocaust") drew together political, economic, social, historical and religious forces in such a way as to portray Jews as expendable and then set out to murder them. This intended genocide killed at least 6 million Jews (a large portion of them children), plus several million others who were also regarded as "expendable."

This course will include lectures, discussions, film clips, and a visit to a Jewish synagogue and the Holocaust museum in St. Louis. Participants should be alerted that the subject matter of this course is graphic and can be at times disturbing and uncomfortable.

The 4th session (Feb. 26) will be a trip with Dr. Cain to the Holocaust museum in St. Louis. Persons registering for this class will be given first preference for this trip. Courses February—March 2014

World War I Movies

2014 marks 100 years since the start of World War 1, the "WAR TO END ALL WARS". We will watch a variety of films with that war as their background. The films deal with the horrors of war on the battlefield and how the lives of people change due to the effects of war.

Week 1: All Quiet on the Western Front is a 1930 American war film based on the Erich Maria Remarque novel of the same name. All Quiet on the Western Front is considered a realistic and harrowing account of warfare in World War I. It was the first to win the Academy Awards for both Outstanding Production and Best Director. It is considered a "great" example of filmmaking.

Week 2: Grand Illusion is a 1937 French war film that concerns class relationships among a small group of French officers who are prisoners of war during World War I and are plotting an escape. The perspective of the film is generously humanistic to its characters of various nationalities. It is regarded by critics and film historians as one of the masterpieces of French cinema and among the greatest films ever made.

Did you know that the state instrument of Missouri is the fiddle?
