#### MID-YEAR MEMBERSHIP DUES

#### Lincoln University Senior Citizen Program

Lincoln University provides the opportunity for persons age 65 or older to take undergraduate courses, on an audit basis only, at a cost of \$25 per semester up to 12 hours. Registration begins on the first day of the semester on a space available basis. Fall semester registration is August 24 and 25. The University also waives all maintenance, student activity and lab fees, and provides free parking.

You may complete a Lincoln University application (one time) and register on the same day. There is a one-time application fee of \$20. # Meramec Music Theatre and Onondaga State Park Cave

#### Saturday, August 15, 2009

How long has it been since you heard your favorite "Golden Oldie" or went for a guided tour through a cave? Travel with us to Meramec Music Theatre and the Onondaga Cave State Park.

Our first destination is Onondaga State Park that features the cave and an interpretive center with gift shop that showcases "The Cave State" and explains the significance of Onondaga Cave. Since the tour of the cave is optional, this should prove interesting for those not touring the cave.

The cave tour is an additional \$5.00. This is a guided one mile, one hour twenty minute walk on a paved surface with handrails, no steps, but some slopes. The cave temperature is  $57^{\circ}$  winter or summer so a light wrap should be considered.

We recommend, for safety reasons, you wear shoes with good traction, as there is the possibility of wet spots on the paved surfaces.

After leaving the Park, we go to Golden Oldies in Steelville for a buffet lunch of meatloaf, ham, vegetables and dessert. After lunch there may be time to wander through specialty shops on Steelville's Main Street that has been restored to its 1900's appearance.

Next is the Meramec Music Theatre which features many types of music, but for this day it will focus on "Golden Oldies", comedy and family entertainment.

#### A Green Energy Adventure

#### Monday - Wednesday, October 12 - 14, 2009

On this learning and exploring trip to Northwest Missouri, we will visit several wind farms, stay at a resort that uses biomass technology for their energy needs, visit an ethanol facility and explore other "green" facets of modern-day living.

After leaving Jefferson City at 7:00 a.m. on Monday, October 12, we stop enroute for a quick lunch on your own, before arriving in Rockport, MO. Rockport is the first community in Missouri to have all their energy needs generated by wind power. The gentleman who was largely responsible for this accomplishment will be our guide.

Traveling on past the lovely Loess Hills of NW Missouri and SW Iowa, we will pause at an ethanol facility before arriving in Nebraska City, NE, where we will spend the night at the Lied Lodge and Conference Center at Arbor Day Farm. An orientation will explain the sustainable solutions and green lodging practices of the Lodge, including a tour of their biomass plant. After checking in, take a walk on the paths past the hazelnut lawn and onto the Arbor Day Farm established by J. Sterling Morton. In fall, the hazelnuts and trees should be at their peak colors. That evening, enjoy a delicious Lodge buffet dinner (included), and then perhaps visit the fitness center or swim in the beautiful indoor pool, complete with a large hot spa.

Breakfast of your choice is included the next morning at the Lodge before we board the coach to visit the nearby Tree Adventure on Arbor Day Farm. Tree-interactive games, a room with changing weather conditions and a tree-ring floor are just some of the indoor adventures. Outside are walking trails, a 5-story tree house, and the Arbor Day Greenhouses. Next you have a choice: take a Discovery Ride around the Arbor Day Farm or tour Mr. Morton's 52 room mansion.

Before leaving Nebraska City, we will visit the Lewis and Clark Interpretive Center. There one can explore a 55 foot long, authentic replica of a keelboat, go into a 48 foot diameter Plains Indian Earth Lodge and see other interactive exhibits. We have lunch planned (included) in a quaint MO River town enroute to our next stop, Squaw Creek National Wildlife Refuge.

In October, Squaw Creek is a stop-over for thousands of migrating waterfowl traveling the Missouri River flyway. We will take in the sights and sounds as we learn more about these beautiful birds and their bi-annual journey.

Next stop, the Drury Inn in St. Joseph, where we plan to arrive in time for the Manager's evening reception. Dinner is on your own at one of several nearby restaurants.

On Wednesday, after breakfast at our hotel (included), we leave for a tour of wind farms at King City and Conception Junction. In King City we will get up close and personal with a windmill and learn more about power generation and distribution. At Conception Junction we will tour the Abbey and enjoy a buffet lunch.

Our next stop is a rare treat. One of only three remaining round "squirrel cage" jails is in Gallatin, MO. We will have a private tour of this historical building. We plan on arriving back in Jefferson City around 7 p.m. after a stop for dinner on your own.

Cost includes all admissions and activities listed in the itinerary, tour related taxes and gratuities, two nights lodging, 2 breakfasts, 2 lunches, 1 dinner.

# The Path of Western Music Development from 12,000 B.C. to the Present

**Presenter:** Dr. Steven Houser is a Professor Emeritus in Music from Lincoln University having taught in the department for 30 years. He currently serves as the conductor of the Jefferson City Symphony Orchestra and plays bassoon in the Columbia Civic Orchestra.

**Course Description:** The instructor will present the development of Western Music through slides, music instruments and music. The music that will be played for the class will represent the major composers of the listed countries. There will also be a video presentation of musicians from Egypt and Sudan.
