Around the College: Lincoln University Cooperative Extension

Youth from the Bootheel Visit Jefferson City; Jefferson City Visits the Bootheel

On April 23 and 24, several youth from the Charleston Lincoln University Cooperative Extension (LUCE) outreach center, under the supervision of Sherry Maxwell, Program Assistant - Southeast Missouri, traveled to Jefferson City,



Missouri, to learn about Lincoln University, state law enforcement, the justice system and health services.

The youth and chaperones toured the campus and ate lunch with Lincoln University's President Rome. Next, they were met by Dr. Randall Williams, Director, Department of Health and Senior Services (DHSS), as part of National Minority Health Month, and Joseph S. Palm, Chief, Office of Minority Health. Afterwards, staff from the Missouri State Highway Patrol (MSHP) headquarters, along with Colonel Sandra Karsten, walked them through the training facility and museum in Jefferson City and served them snacks.

The second day, they visited with Senator Shaloon "Kiki" Curls, Representative Don Rone and Representative Tila Hubrecht at the State Capitol. Youth observed the legislative process and toured the building. Later that day, Supreme Court Judge George W. Draper III took time to explain the judicial process and share significant historical facts about the courts in Missouri as he walked the youth through the Supreme Court Building.

Then, on June 3, Maxwell held a community-wide event in Lilbourn, Missouri, that united law enforcement and local citizens to promote a better way to live together. The name of the program, B.A.T.T.E.R. U.P., stands for "Back At The Things Everyone Remembers—Uniting People!"

Many of the same organizations that welcomed the youth in Jefferson City in April traveled to Lilbourn for a softball game, face painting, Shriner clowns and educational and informational booths, all to build stronger relationships within the community between law enforcement and within families. The primary goal was to promote the message "Stepping Up to Stomp Out Violence!"

Maxwell, also known as "Miss Sherry," was dressed in an old-fashioned uniform to emcee the event. MSHP Colonel Sandra K. Karsten, the first female trooper in Troop E, threw the opening pitch. At least 800 people signed in, but it is estimated that 1,000 were in attendance.





